The ack of any upward impetus from Lon-don and the utler indifference mainfested to the bank statement offered a poor market in which to realize, or selling by yesterday's buyers might have been larg-er. In the absence, of demand they seem-ds atisfield to keep their holdings, but there was no inclination to add to them. The bank statement fully redected the expected reflux of unemployed funds to New York, the totil gain in cash being no loss than \$1,536,000. It was not suspect-ed that amployment for these funds had been found to be as large an extent as was fadicated by the Joan expansion of \$1,57,100. The buying of mercantile paper by the banks, which has been more ac-tive during the week, will scurcely ac-count for much of this increase, and cer-tiling no operations on the stock ex-change are sufficient to account for it. Unless some special transaction is dis-closed to explain it, it is probable that the business of industrial combination and filotation is beinning the vall itself again of the easier money rates.
