NEWS OF THE COURTS

Verdict for Defendants in Ten Thousand Dollar Damage Suit.

Divorce Suit Instituted and a Divorce Granted--Naturalized--Wanted Her Husband Released--A Missing "Aunt Mary"--A Happy Old Negro.

Judge A. R. Hanckel, of the Corporation Court, presided in the Court of Law and Chancery yesterday, Judge Martin being indisposed.

The case of Orange Epps' administrator against the Old Dominion Steamship Company, a suit for \$10,000 damages for the loss of the life of Orange Epps, colored, was tried, a verdict for the defendant being rendered by the jury.

Epps was a longshoreman, and was killed on the deck of the Old Dominion Steamship Company's steamer Hampton Roads, by a heavy piece of machinery, which was being moved, falling on him. The attorneys for the plaintiff were Messrs. George McIntosh and Green Withers, Captain William H. White and Mr. J. W. Willcox appeared for the defense.

A DIVORCE ASKED FOR. Mrs. Ada Emily Pentress, through her attorney Mr. Hugh G. Miller, yesterday instituted in the Court of Law and Chancery a suit for a divorce from her husband, J. D. Pentress, whom she alleges deserted her.

The couple were married in this city November 19, 1890. The husband is now supposed to be in England.

Mrs. Pentress asks the court to grant her the custody of their two children, an 8-year-old son and a 6-year-old daughter.

A DIVORCE GRANTED. An absolute divorce was granted Harry J. Ives, a trucker of Princess Anne county, from his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Ives, who resides on Bermuda street, this city. The case was tried before Judge Martin, in the Court of Law and Chancery, the ground being desertion, which was admitted by the defendant.

Mr. John G. Tilton represented the plaintiff.

PROJECT TO UNITE

A Proposed Railroad Combination South of Washington.

Mutuality of Interests--Scheme for a Great Union Depot at the Capital is Also Receiving Attention--Other Matters of Interest.

The latest move along the policy of mutuality of interests in railway management is a project to unite the line belonging to the Pennsylvania Railroad running from Washington, D. C., to Quantico, Va., and the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad, extending from Quantico to Richmond.

It is proposed to make the combination for the purpose of maintaining an open highway for railroad service between the North and South and the parties named as likely to be in such an agreement, if it is consummated, are to be the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Baltimore and Ohio, the Atlantic Coast Line and the Southern Railway.

One of the happiest negroes in Norfolk to-day is William Murphy, aged about 65 years old, who was sentenced to six months in jail by Justice Tomlin some days ago on the testimony of a citizen, who swore that he saw Murphy opening a window shutter on Charlotte street at 12 o'clock at night.

Yesterday several parries from the Naval Hospital appeared before Justice Tomlin and testified that the old dardier had been employed around the hospital for five years, and had an excellent character. The former decision of the court was reversed, and Murphy was once more a free man.

MINOR POLICE COURT CASES. Henry Smith, colored, was fined \$3 for using profane language on the street.

Mary Randolph, colored, contributed \$3 for assaulting James Scott with a fork.

John Perkins, colored, suspected of stealing a pistol, and because he could not furnish a \$150 bond for his appearance this morning, was detained over night.

MR. ROWLAND ACQUITTED. Mr. Charles H. Rowland, of Ferguson's Wharf, was arrested on the night of March 15 on the charge of stealing about \$300 worth of timber from Mr. W. L. Newton. The case was called for trial before Magistrate Ferguson, at Virginia Beach, yesterday, and resulted in Mr. Rowland being honorably acquitted.

Mr. George A. Frick, of the firm of Duncan & Frick, appeared for the defense and Mr. Robert against the prosecution. Several witnesses were introduced, but the evidence was rather shaky. The defense contended that Mr. Rowland bought a quantity of standing timber from a man named Cory, and thought that the aforesaid timber was on his (Cory's) land, and Mr. Rowland employed men to cut it. The land on which the timber grew is situated about one and a half miles from Virginia Beach. Mr. Newton claimed that the timber was his property, but his inability to prove his claim to the satisfaction of the court resulted in a dismissal of the charge.

ASSESSING CANDIDATES. DEMOCRATIC WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE MEETING.

The committee appointed to provide ways and means for holding the coming primary for municipal offices held a meeting at Captain W. W. Dey's office yesterday afternoon. Each office was assessed according to its worth to the incumbent, and where there is more than one candidate for one office the assessment upon this office is proportioned among these candidates. The expense thus falls lightly upon those who are taking chances against several opponents, while those who have only one or no opponent have to pay more.

The committee will report its assessment upon each office at the meeting of the City Democratic Executive Committee to-night. Under the primary law no candidate may participate in the selection of an electoral board or enter the primary until he shall have paid the assessment against him.

The Political Cauldron. The political cauldron in Norfolk is beginning to simmer, and the supporters of the various candidates are busily engaged in piling on fagots daily. A favorite means of advertising the designs of the candidates to serve the people is by the use of cards big and little, and banners which are strung across the street, some of them bearing the picture of the candidate in whose behalf they were unfurled to the breeze. Meanwhile the job printers and banner makers are doing a thriving business.
