THE BIG CONVENTION.

Leaders Democracy Assembling Here From All Parts of the State.

A Few Arrived Yesterday and Last Night But the Main Body Will Arrive Here This Morning—Committee Appointed By State Central Committee Will Organize For Work This Morning—Believed That The District, City and County Committees Will Be Given Greater Authority—Generally Understood That Chairman Ellyson, After Calling the Convention to Order, Will Name Senator Hal Flood, of Appomattox County, for Temporary Chairman.

The most important State Convention held in Virginia in twenty years will meet in the Armory Hall to-morrow at 12 o'clock.

Several well-known politicians arrived yesterday and others came in on the train last night. The Southwest and Valley delegations will reach Norfolk this morning over the N. & W., and C. & O.

The committee appointed by the State Central Committee consisting of one representative from each Congressional district will be quartered at the Montecello and this morning will organize for work. It is thought that greater authority will be given the District and City and County Committees, and that a very comprehensive and satisfactory plan will be submitted to the convention for adoption.

It is generally understood that Chairman Ellyson after calling the convention to order will name Senator Hal Flood of Appomattox County for temporary chairman. This honor will be tendered as a recognition of his efforts in behalf of the bill giving the people a right to vote on the question of calling a constitutional convention.

Mr. Flood has been a member of the Legislature about ten years and was chairman of the Com-

TWO BURGLARS CAGED.

CLEVER WORK OF NORFOLK DETECTIVES SUNDAY. Sunday night, one week ago, the residences of Messrs. W. D. Pender and John G. Tilton, well-known Norfolk attorneys, were burglarized. Monday morning these gentlemen reported their losses, with a description of the missing articles, to police headquarters, with the result that on Sunday night last Sergeant of Detectives Heppel and Detective Snowden, with the assistance of Policemen Watson and Taylor, rounded up Lewis Ward and Alex. Luke, two well-known young colored men, who have each served a term in the State penitentiary for stealing, and recovered a portion of the missing articles. The burglars will be given a hearing before Justice Tomlin this morning.

The articles taken from Mr. Pender's residence consisted of wearing apparel belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Pender and their children. Mr. Tilton's larder was robbed of a supply of edibles and milk which had been provided for breakfast Monday morning.

Both of these negroes were detected in stealing by Detective Heppel, convicted and sent to the State penitentiary. Ward is described as a desperado, having beaten an Italian woman severely and robbed a shoe store. They will doubtless get a second term, with five years added for their last offense, and later on a life term will be given them for a third offense.

YACHT RACE.

Any one desiring to enter boats can do so. No entrance fee, but all boats are expected to pay their portion of towing to the starting point. Any boat using other than ordinary or copper paint will not be considered in the race. No restriction as to sail, ballast, etc.

Ordinance Relating To Sidewalks.

At a meeting of the Street Committee yesterday an ordinance was drawn up for presentation to the Common and Select Councils relating to the care of sidewalks. The ordinance provides that the city shall keep in repair all sidewalks within the city which are now paved. In case an owner of property wishes more expensive paving than the one proposed, he is to pay the difference. Owners of property in front of which the sidewalks are not now paved shall, when determined upon by the Councils, pave the same as requested by the Councils. No person shall pave a sidewalk without first obtaining permission from the Board of Street, Sewer and Drain Commissioners. No person shall disturb or dig up any paved sidewalk without first obtaining permission from the same board. Any person injuring a sidewalk shall be required by the board to pay the City Treasurer such amount as shall be estimated by the board to repair the injury. 

mittee on privileges and Elections. He is an aggressive and forceful speaker and a legislator of ability. Hon. E. W. Saunders of Franklin county will in all probability be the permanent chairman. Mr. Saunders is one of the best presiding officers in the State. He presided at the Roanoke Convention and was speaker of the House of Delegates at the last session of the Legislature. He is cool, careful and prompt. No convention will trifle with time if Mr. Saunders is in the chair.

ELECTORS AT LARGE.

There are four candidates for electors at large—two will be appointed. State Senator John Jeffries, of Culpeper, a candidate for Attorney-General, is an avowed candidate for one of these honors. Mr. Jeffries is the law partner of Congressman James Hay, of the Seventh district. He is said to be a fine stumper and will likely have at his back the delegates from the Seventh and Eighth districts. He expects a good following from the Fifth, Ninth and Second districts.

Senator Glass, of Lynchburg, is another candidate for elector at large. He will have a part of the delegates from the Sixth, a part of the Tenth and a part of the First districts. Mr. Glass is editor of the Lynchburg News and a good speaker.

Senator Barksdale, of Halifax county, is in the Sixth district, and will divide that vote with Mr. Glass. He also expects to get votes in the Fifth district and the State at large. Mr. Barksdale was an original Bryan man at the last National Convention, and voted for that gentleman first, last and all the time. On this account the honor of presiding over the Bryan meeting this winter in Richmond was conferred on him. Mr. Barksdale comes with the solid vote of his county, one of the largest in the State. He is also a good stumper and is about as aggressive "as they make them."

The fourth candidate, Hon. E. W. Saunders, of Franklin county, comes from the Fifth District. He is certain to have a following in every part of the State. It is doubtful if Virginia can produce a stumper speaker of greater ability than Mr. Saunders. The friends of these candidates will reach Norfolk to-day and will begin work in earnest.
