RICHMOND BOY FOUND AT LAST.

The Missing son of Bishop Granbery Located in Cincinnati.

IN THE UNITED STATES ARMY.

He Wandered from Home and has Caused His Excellent People Great Trouble.

President Stevens, of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway, Gives the Commonwealth Club an Excursion—Reduction in Freight Rates—Two Colored Tickets in Jackson Ward—The Proposed Constitutional Convention.

Richmond, Va., May 5.—Some weeks ago, as reported in the Virginian-Pilot, Winston H. Granbery, son of Bishop John C. Granbery, head of the Methodist Church in Virginia, disappeared from this city, where he had been engaged in business as runner for the State Bank.

His parents had no information as to his movements, beyond the fact that he had gone West. To-day, however, news was received from Cincinnati that he had turned up in that city last Friday and joined the United States Army.

The recruiting officer young Granbery said that he had won \$75 playing roulette in Richmond and had made up his mind to take a trip. He bought a ticket to Cincinnati and upon reaching that city got into a game of craps and lost all his money.

For three days he had nothing to eat except what he could get from french counters, and when he appeared at the recruiting station he was so weak and emaciated that he was under weight. The officers kept him three days and he fattened seven pounds. He was then allowed to enlist.

The young man served with a Virginia company in the war with Spain, and was in Cuba for awhile. He has been quite wild and given his excellent parents a great deal of trouble. It is said that he will be sent to the Philippines as soon as he has been sufficiently drilled.

EXCURSION PARTY.

President George W. Stevens, of the Chesapeake and Ohio railway, this morning took the Commonwealth Club, about 500 persons in all, down to Old Point on a special train.

At Old Point the party boarded the splendid steamer, "Pennywain," of the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk line. They returned to Old Point after a trip down the bay, and spent several hours there, returning to Richmond to-night.

REDUCTION IN FREIGHT RATES.

There has been a reduction made in proportional or reshipping rate on hay, east, which will become effective Monday. The rates on hay from Cincinnati, New Albany and Jeffersonville to Virginia cities will also be lower by five cents per hundred tons, the present tariff.

The Chesapeake and Ohio's new schedule goes into effect next week. One of the features will be the putting into service of a new train, to be known as No. 32, from Richmond to Old Point, leaving this city at 9 a. m. and arriving at Old Point at 11:10 a. m.

The flyer between Old Point and Richmond will be known as No. 33, and will leave Old Point at 5 p. m., arriving here at 7:10 o'clock. Only two regular stops are scheduled on the run—Williamsburg and Newport News.

TWO COLORED TICKETS.

The negro Republicans, who are preparing to capture the ward in which they live, are having trouble. They met some time ago and nominated a ticket for the city council. Now somebody has certified two colored tickets to the Clerk of the Hustings Court. The negro leaders claim that there have been forgeries, and are hustling around after affidavits to prevent these names being put on the official ballots. The negroes will not be permitted to elect their ticket.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVISIONISTS.

Advocates of the Constitutional Convention have decided to hold a number of public meetings in various parts of the city between now and election day. Distinguished speakers will be on hand and a strong effort made to stir the voters up.

BIENNIAL SESSION OF SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION. (Special to Virginian-Pilot.)

Franklin, Va., May 5.—The Southern Christian Convention met in biennial session here last night. After devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. J. W. Whitlow, of Durham, N. C., President, the convention adjourned.

A quorum being present, the convention was organized as follows: Rev. P. H. Flemming, of Burlington, N. C., president; Dr. J. S. Manning, of Millersville, Ga., vice-president; Rev. J. E. Foster, of Raleigh, N. C., assistant secretary; Prof. P. J. Kenndick, of Elon College, N. C., being standing secretary, and Mr. P. A. Mills, Raleigh, standing treasurer.

The retiring president, Rev. W. W. Staley, D. D., of Suffolk, Va., delivered the chief, forceful presentation of facts pertaining to the present status and future plans of the church. The three points of the address presented and at length discussed, were: 1. Church enlarged; 2. Church extension; 3. Church strengthened.

Attention was called to the various interests and enterprises of the church, and special stress laid upon the call.
