FRATERNITY NOTES.

The Odd Fellows of Norfolk are making extensive preparations for attending the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the United States, which convenes in Richmond September next. The order numbers about 1,500 members in this city and an effort will be made to have a very large delegation at Richmond to join in the grand street parade to come off during the session of the Grand Lodge. A new lodge of the order has just been instituted in Richmond with a membership of over 400. Their organization is the oldest and largest in numbers of any secret order in this country. In this city each individual lodge is in a sound financial condition. Its growth here is steady and substantial.

Nansemond Conclave, Heptasophs, or S. W. M., which meets in regular session at Dr. W. M. H. Smith's, with its past few months, and, like its sister conclave in Norfolk, is adding new members to its rolls. On next Thursday night a number of candidates will be inducted into the mysteries of the order. A delegation from the several conclaves in this city will visit Nansemond Lodge and assist in conferring the work upon the new members. At the close refreshments will be served.

Friendship Conclave No. 2 Heptasophs, or S. W. M., is still adding to its numbers. At its regular meeting Friday night two new members were elected and one application received. There are about ten more propositions to be acted upon which, when elected, will form a second class of eighteen for initiation into the mysteries of the order. The first class of twenty-five will be made full-fledged Heptasophs on the first meeting night in June. This conclave paid at its last meeting \$60 to the undertaker for the burial of Mr. Gray, one of its members, who died on the 17th of this month. As soon as the proper papers are drawn up the widow will receive the funeral benefit fund.

Cambridge Lodge No. 44, I. O. O. F., at its meeting last Tuesday night, had work in the second degree. The representatives of this lodge to the Grand Lodge, which recently convened at the Hot Springs, gave an interesting report of the proceedings there. The Post Grand's Association, whose organization was an idea originating with this lodge, bids fair to become of much importance, with the sanction of the grand master. There will be work in the third degree next Tuesday night.

Norfolk Lodge No. 125, Knights of the Mystic Chain, held a regular meeting Friday night and had a very delightful and harmonious session. A code of by-laws is under consideration. The lodge is in a flourishing condition. Now that the Great Council of the Improved Order of Red Men has adjourned after a very harmonious session, the delegates from this section will have many interesting things to give the brethren of the local tribes at their meetings during the week now opening. The order showed an increase throughout the State that is most gratifying. The present membership is over 4,000. Huntersville Lodge of Odd Fellows held a very pleasant session Thursday night. The attendance was large, and brothers of the Mystic Tie entered into the spirit of the meeting. An address was made by a distinguished member of the order from Washington, D. C., that awakened much enthusiasm among the brothers.

SOUTHERN STUDENT CONFERENCE.

LEADERS OF COLLEGE Y. M. C. A. WORK TO ASSEMBLE IN ASHEVILLE IN JUNE.

The seventh annual Southern Student Conference will be held in Asheville, N. C., June 15 to 24, inclusive. This meeting is a conference of the leaders of college Young Men's Christian Associations throughout the South for training in Bible teaching and in methods of developing religious work and missionary interest in college. It is held under the auspices of the student department of the International Committee of Young Men's Christian Associations. The use of the buildings and grounds of the Bingham School has been extended to the conference by Colonel Robert Bingham.

The daily program of the conference consists of platform meetings for the deepening of the spiritual life, normal Bible classes, fostering missionary interest in college, conferences for the discussion of methods of promoting Christian work among students and life work meetings on the mountain side at sunset. The presentation of the Christian callings that need college men. The afternoons will be devoted to athletics under the direction of a committee of athletes from the leading universities of the South. Walking trips and excursions will be taken to the finest points of view.

Among the prominent leaders of Christian thought and work who have been secured as speakers are Mr. Robt. E. Speer, of New York; Rev. Charles R. Erdman, of Germantown, Pa.; Rev. E. C. Dargan, D. D., of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.; Dr. Walter R. Lambuth, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; Rev. R. G. Pearson, D. D., of Asheville, and Rev. Carl E. Grammer, D. D., of Norfolk. Mr. C. K. Ober, field secretary of the International Committee, will preside at the conference.

Bible classes will be taught by Mr. F. M. Gilbert, of Boston, and Mr. Augustus Nash, of Cleveland, O. The college conferences will be directed by Messrs. H. M. Melhany, Jr., George Gleason and H. P. Anderson, secretaries of the student department, while the missionary interests will be in charge of Mr. F. P. Turner and Dr. C. W. Ottley, secretaries of the student volunteer movement for foreign missions. Last year fourteen States were represented by over two hundred delegates from sixty-eight different institutions. It is expected that the attendance this year will be even greater. A rate of one fare for the round trip has been granted by all railroads in the South. In connection with this conference there will be held a conference for city and town Young Men's Christian Association workers who will participate in the platform meetings with the student delegates, but will have separate sessions for the discussion of methods of work. This will be in charge of C. K. Ober and C. L. Gates, field secretaries of the International Committee, assisted by various Southern State and local secretaries. It is expected that secretaries, officers and other workers of the Young Men's Christian Associations throughout the South will attend this conference.

On Thursday evening, at the residence of Mr. John L. Roper, No. 160 Freemason street, Miss Florence Dillard, of Richmond, assisted by Miss Elizabeth Taylor and Messrs. Richards and Jenkins, of this city, will give a recital for the benefit of the nurse work of the City Union of the King's Daughters. Miss Dillard is a member of the Ladies' Matinee Musical of Richmond, and has played before the Women's Club and the Wednesday Club. She studied in Berlin with Carl Hall, and had concert training under the famous Eugene Ysaie, of Brussels.

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St. Louis Exposition.

(By Telegram to Virginian-Pilot.) Washington, May 19.—The subcommittee of the Committee on the World's Exposition at St. Louis in 1903 to-day met and perfected the bill in accordance with the instructions of the full committee. The bill will be printed and submitted to the full committee on Tuesday, when final action will be taken. As it will be presented to the full committee the bill will carry \$5,000,000, and give the Government one-half of the proceeds, placing the Government on a par with the people of St. Louis and the bondholders.
