APPLICATION REFUSED.

Chesapeake Boat Club Wanted to Erect New Boat House.

The Owners of Property Abutting the Desired Location Objected, and Street Committee Disapproved Application—The Finance Committee Has a Meeting.

The street committee of the Council held a meeting at the city treasurer's office yesterday afternoon to finally consider the application of the Chesapeake Boat Club to build a boat house in the edge of the river off Botetourt street. The matter was referred to the city attorney at a previous meeting for an opinion as to the city's right to grant the application in the face of objection from the abutting property owners.

City Attorney Taylor advised the committee that the city could not lease out an end of a street without the consent of abutting property owners or without compensating them for the inconvenience which might result to them from the use of the street for purposes which it was not originally intended it should be used.

Inasmuch as all of the abutting property owners objected to the erection of the boat house at the place named in the club's application, the committee disapproved the application. The boat club had counsel before the committee at former meetings.

An effort will probably be made by the club to secure another convenient location for the boat house. The location which has been disapproved, or will be when the street committee's report is adopted, is between the present boat house and the C. & O. wharf.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETS.

The finance committee held a meeting yesterday afternoon at which the city's financial affairs were "run over," as one of the members expressed it, for the ending of the fiscal year. Several of the city officials appeared before the committee. Among them were Treasurer Herman and Chairman Hoffheimer of the street, sewer and drain board.

Southern and Seaboard Clash.

Word comes from Columbia, S. C., that the Southern and the Seaboard have clashed over an agreement as to handling transfer traffic at this point. As a result, the Seaboard will deliver freights at the doors of consignees in Columbia. The Southern has control of nearly all the tracking in the city, and has been charging other lines \$1.50 a car for placing cars, but the Seaboard has no connecting track nearer than Cayce—three miles—as it runs through the city on trestles. The Southern has notified the Seaboard that it will charge rail local rate between Columbia and Cayce for handling transfer business, and the Seaboard objects, deeming this is considerably more than the amount agreed on between the Southern and other roads.

Excursion from Wilmington.

The Wilmington excursionists, who left for this city Tuesday morning, spent yesterday here and will return at 11 o'clock today.

They are traveling over the Seaboard Air Line, in charge of Thomas Knight, the colored manager. The train consists of eleven passenger coaches, refreshment and baggage cars, and there are about 700 passengers, a number of them being visitors, for whom special cars are provided.

The party will arrive at Wilmington before day on Tuesday.

Prominent Kentuckians Expected.

A number of prominent Kentuckians, among whom will probably be some of the State officials and several Kentucky belles, are expected to come to Old Point within a few days to see the new battle-ship Kentucky's test. The Kentucky has but recently gone into commission, and her official test will take place soon.

ARMOR PLATE PLANT.

IT MAY BE ESTABLISHED NEAR NORFOLK OR PORTSMOUTH.

The Naval Appropriation bill, recently passed by the House, gives the Secretary of the Navy authority to establish a Government armor plate factory, if, in his judgment, the price demanded by the armor plate trust is too exorbitant. This amendment was passed in a different form by the Senate, and the matter goes to a conference committee.

When the bill was under consideration in the House Representative Rixey made a speech in favor of a Government armor plate plant, and he intimated that the vicinity of Norfolk, where there was a navy-yard, and of Newport News, where the largest shipyard and drydock in the country is located, would be a good and convenient place for the construction of such a plant, the cost of which is not to exceed \$4,000,000.

When the House Naval Committee visited this section several weeks ago it was rumored that the members came here partly for the purpose of learning the advantages of this section for such a plant.

MATTERS POLITICAL.

CAUCUS OF COUNCILMEN ON CERTAIN OFFICES TO BE HELD.

Nearly all of the newly elected Councilmen qualified yesterday for the two years' term, from July next to July, 1902.

There is talk of a caucus of the Councilmen about June 1st, for the selection of several officials selected every two years by the Council.

It is very probable that such a caucus will be held, and the question of who will sit on the bench in the Police Court, and who will direct the police force for the next two years will be decided among other matters.

For the police justiceship there are three applicants who may be said to be real factors in the fight at present, and their strength is very nearly evenly divided. They are Judge Thomas H. Wilcox, Captain Tazewell Taylor and Captain A. J. Dakin. All are in the race to stay till the finish.

Captain Prince denies the printed statement in one of the Norfolk papers that he had withdrawn from the race for the Police Chieftancy. He is still opposing Chief Kizer. It is almost certain that Captain George L. Cuthrell, until two years ago, a captain of police, being succeeded by Captain Prince, will make application for reappointment to his old place.

Mr. W. F. Allen, one of the retiring First Ward Councilmen, will oppose Mr. J. D. Hoffheimer for chairman of the Street, Sewer and Drain Board.

Death of an Old Resident.

One of Norfolk's oldest and most widely known residents, Mrs. Margaret McCarrick, passed away yesterday. Mrs. McCarrick was the widow of Captain Patrick McCarrick and the mother of Captain James W. McCarrick, Miss Ellen Bohan and Miss Madge McCarrick, of this city, and Mrs. Carpointa, of Washington.

Mrs. McCarrick was in the first year of her age, and had been quite feeble for a long time. Returning yesterday morning from a trip to Washington to see her daughter, she was overcome by weakness and gradually lost consciousness, passing away peacefully and without suffering, at 11:30 o'clock.

The deceased was a member of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church, of which she had been one of the founders. She was always a consistent Catholic, and took great interest in everything connected with the church.

Always whole-souled and hospitable, charitable and public-spirited, her death will be felt and mourned far and wide.

The funeral will be from Sacred Heart Church on Saturday at 10 a. m.

HELD WITHOUT BAIL.

Charles J. Dougherty Sent On to the Grand Jury.

He is Charged with Attempting to Criminally Assault a Child Seven Years Old—Jordan, Charged with the Murder of Douglass, Waives Examination—Capps Held as Accessory.

Upon the charge of attempting criminal assault upon little Jessie Sawyer, only seven years old, Charles J. Dougherty, a painter in the employ of L. F. Pentres, 31 Bank street, was committed to jail by Police Justice Tomlin yesterday morning without bail.

The accused has formerly borne a good reputation in this city. Dougherty, who is about 31 years old, and who lives at 62 Falkland street, has been well acquainted with Mrs. Sarah E. Sawyer and her little daughter, Jessie, for some time, and was regarded as a friend of the family. Saturday afternoon last, Jessie Sawyer, who had been walking on Fenchurch street, went home and told her mother of a conversation which she said had occurred between herself and Dougherty, whom she met on Fenchurch street, and also told of the latter's conduct toward her. It was said that after making improper suggestions to her Dougherty caught hold of the little girl's arm.

The warrant upon which Dougherty was arrested was sworn out by Mrs. Sawyer, who is a widow, living at 32 Mariner street. In Police Court yesterday morning the child told Justice Tomlin the same story she had told her mother. She said Dougherty tried to get her to go with him, and gave her some money, with which she bought candy.

The mother testified as to what the child told her, using the same words the latter used in telling her mother about the alleged attempted assault.

Dougherty testified in his own behalf. He had no lawyer. He said he had known little Jessie Sawyer for some months, had ridden her on his wheel and seen her at her mother's house several times. He said he was drinking Saturday afternoon when he saw the little girl, but was certain that she was mistaken as to what he said to her, and denied that he had any bad intentions.

Dougherty has been in Norfolk over a year. His home is in Johnson City, East Tennessee. He has a divorced wife living at Elizabethtown, Tenn. The charge against him will be investigated by the grand jury, which meets next week.

Justice Tomlin held that the laying of hands upon the child by Dougherty constituted a technical attempt to assault.

JORDAN-CAPPS MURDER CASE.

When the grand jury meets next week the charge of murder against James H. Jordan, colored, and the charge against Tom Capps, colored, of being an accessory to the murder, will be investigated. Both were held by Justice Tomlin yesterday morning without bail.

Jordan waived examination. Capps asked for a preliminary hearing, and the evidence in his case was about the same as presented to the grand jury, which expressed the belief that he was an accessory before the fact to the murder of Joe Douglass, colored, last Monday evening at the corner of Smith and Queen streets. It was testified that he grabbed Douglass as Jordan stabbed him.

Jordan will be represented by P. J. Morris, John G. Wilson and William H. Land, the latter colored. Capps had no counsel yesterday.

HINES DISCHARGED.

Police Justice Tomlin dismissed the warrant yesterday against John Hines, colored, charging him with voting illegally in the First Ward in the recent election. The warrant was sworn out by Captain M. H. Prince, of the police force.

It was admitted by Hines that he did not live in the First Ward, but he said he was registered in that ward through a mistake, and when he voted, he said, he thought he lived in the ward.

Registrar J. Salomonsky, of the First Ward, testified that Hines came to him to register, giving his name and address. He lives on Union street, in the Second Ward, but Registrar Salomonsky said he believed him to be a resident of the First Ward when he was registered.

It was also shown by the registrar's testimony that others had been registered in the wrong ward through a mistake.

A PAVER SENT TO JAIL.

Charles T. George, a paver, was sentenced to thirty days in jail on the charge of stealing valuable brass piping from the Atlantic Hotel. George was well known and had previously borne a good reputation.

SEABOARD AIR LINE.

WITH OPENING OF THROUGH SERVICE IT WITHDRAWS DIFFERENTIALS. (New York Times.)

The reorganized Seaboard Air Line, which will open its through line between New York and Tampa and Jacksonville, Fla., the latter part of this week, has announced that it purposes to withdraw its differential fares between points where it is the short line as well as to points to which it will extend its sleeping car service from this city. The Seaboard desires to make an advance in its fares about June 5th. This will meet with the approval of other railroads which extend to southern points, and which are not disposed to grant differential privileges to the Seaboard Air Line, in view of its improved facilities.

On this point Vice-President and General Manager St. John says: "Differentials may exist for a few days as heretofore, while proper adjustments are being made in train service, but the Seaboard has no idea of continuing differentials to points to which it is the short line where equality of service exists."

DISPUTE OVER YACHT RACE—DID R. H. BAKER, JR., COMPLETE COURSE?

There are two claimants for the honor of winning yesterday's yacht race, and up to a late hour last night the dispute was not settled.

The R. H. Baker, Jr., crossed the line on the eighth of a mile ahead of the Hattie S., but several crafts claimed that the former did not go over the entire course.

The Siren, with the judges on board, was obliged to keep in the ship channel, and could not follow the boats over the flats. Hence the judgment will have to rest upon evidence.

In the sloop class, the "West Wind" beat the Howard by about 30 minutes. The race was little more than a drifting match, except for a fair blow about ten minutes before the finish. The start was at 10:32 a. m., and the R. H. Baker, Jr., crossed the line at 4:15 p. m.

The course was a triangular one, from Boush's Buoy Light Ship around Middle Ground Light to the Bell Buoy, and thence to the start.

There were no prizes, the race being of the scrub variety.
