N. & W. PIER REQUEST GRANTED.

president, and the executive session was called.

EXECUTIVE SESSION.

The board had a long executive session, during which, it is said, the question of granting the request of the railway and the objections raised by the citizens and special agents were fully discussed. The discussion resulted in a resolution by Mr. Joseph P. Weaver, seconded by Mr. Jonathan H. Jacobs, as follows:

"Resolved: That permission is hereby granted to the Norfolk and Western Railway Company to construct a new iron coal pier at Lambert's Point, to the south of their present coal pier now located there, in accordance with their plans and specifications now on file in this office; provided, that if in the future said pier shall be condemned by lawful authority as an obstruction to Norfolk's harbor or its approaches, then and in that event the said company, at its expense, shall remove their own expense, in a reasonable time, as much of said pier as may be so condemned."

This resolution was carried unanimously. That ended the meeting.

THE PETITIONS PRESENTED.

The petitions presented to the board and signatures on them are as follows: To the Honorable the Board of Harbor Commissioners of Norfolk, Portsmouth and Norfolk County, Gentlemen: We, the undersigned citizens, feeling a deep interest in the prosperity of our cities and county, having an abiding faith in the future growth and development of our commerce, believing that your predecessors in office are doing their best to improve our harbor by allowing the present pier of the Norfolk and Western Railroad Company at Lambert's Point to be extended out to the Port Warden's line; believing that the line is not far off when the said pier shall have been shortened and the channel widened in order to accommodate our rapidly increasing shipping interests; realizing that the cost of such needed improvement will probably be borne by Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Norfolk county, and having been informed that the Norfolk and Western Railroad Company has made application to your honorable body for permission to build another large coal pier out to the Port Warden's line, do most earnestly request you not to grant the permission to build the proposed pier until the said Company enters into a contract with the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth and Norfolk county; the form of which is to be approved by the said cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth, with good security, approved by the said attorneys, that in the event that the proper authorities should at any time in the future decide to extend the channel at Lambert's Point, so as to cut off the end of the present pier and the end of the proposed new pier, the said Norfolk and Western Railroad Company bear the whole cost of the proposed pier, and that the said pier shall be deemed necessary by the said authorities. We most earnestly protest against the concession being made to the said company unless our people and our port are thus safeguarded.

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
