SCHOOL BOARD MEETS.

Declined to Consider the Cen-tenary Church Offer.

Miss Gatewood and Miss Glenn are Elect-ed Fire Drill to be Put in Practice in Schools. Five Relief Maps are to be Pur-chased.

At a meeting of the School Board yes-terday afternoon the following mem-bers were present: Messrs. Whitehead, president; Taylor, secretary; Doble, Superintendent; Minter, Ruffin, Mon-cure, Morris, Rowland, Davis, Pinker-ton and Pampin.

A letter from Mr. S. Q. Collins, of the Board of Stewards, offered the Cen-tenary M. E. Church, corner of Queca and Boush streets, to the School Board for the use as a schoolhouse.

Mr. Davis said that as the building was not adapted for the purpose, and as it would cost several thousands of dollars to remodel it, the quickest plan was to decide at once not to consider the offer. Even if the building were renovated for school purposes it would never be a first-class school building, hence as the board did not mean to con-sider the proposition, he urged that the question be not referred to a committee at all, but that the secretary be in-structed to write a letter stating that the building is not suitable.

A letter from the ladies of the Home Mission Society stated that the chil-dren of the public schools here are not drilled for escape in case of a fire. The letter commended the fire drill as ad-vantageous and precautionary, and re-commended that a fire drill be adopted in the schools here.

After a brief discussion the sugges-tion was adopted, and Superintendent Doble was instructed to have a fire drill started in the schools. One of the reports of Superintendent Doble for the month of October showed as fol-lows:

Enrollment of pupils, white3,228 Enrollment of pupils, colored1,131 Total4,359 Attendance, white2,938 Attendance, colored 945 Total3,883

During the month there were 78 white children dropped from the rolls and no colored children. There were no seats vacant in the colored schools and 154 in the white schools.

Superintendent Doble stated that the new colored school had been opened and is in successful operation. There were 170 pupils to begin, but the num-ber had increased to 216.

He stated also that he and Prof. Geo. McK. Bain had visited Charlottesville to attend the Teachers' Educational Association, which met there recently.

One of the chief objects of the meet-ing was to induce the university to adopt the plan of examining applicants for entrance to the classes there. As it is now, there is no examination, so that anybody can enter the classes for study.

There was no action taken by the university on the suggestion. Mr. Doble stated that he believes no action will be taken. Anybody may go there to study.

Superintendent Doble said there were ten students at the university from here. They are graduates of the High School and are taking a high stand in the subjects they pursue. One of the professors complimented the boys from Norfolk for their proficiency and for the admirable preparation they have had.

Mr. Ruffin, of the Committee on Text Books and Teachers, reported favorably on the qualifications of Miss Lizzie C. Gatewood, stating that the commit-tee esteem her competent and experi-enced and it is glad of the opportunity to secure her services.

Mr. Doble moved that the secretary cast the vote of the board for Miss Gatewood as a substitute teacher.

Mr. Ruffin reported favorably, also, on the qualifications and ability of Miss H. L. Oulton and Miss Jennie Glenn.

The ballots showed that Miss Glenn was chosen by a vote of 7 to 3.

The superintendent was authorized to purchase five relief maps at a total cost of \$85 for the High School and the four new schools in the old part of the city.

The thanks of the board were extend-ed to the Young Daughters of the Con-federacy for the portraits of General Lee, presented to the schools; to Great Bridge Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, for medals pre-sented to the public school pupils, and sent to the Junior Order United American Mechanics for Bibles and flags present-ed to the schools.
