STOPPED A FUNERAL.

On Wednesday the remains of a colored man named Bell were brought here from New York for interment. Bell was formerly from Portsmouth. The funeral was to take place from the residence of his uncle on King street. A hearse was hired from a man named Morris, in Norfolk. The carriage was hired from Mr. W. J. Davis. Mr. Davis is not a member of the Norfolk, Portsmouth and Berkley Livermen's Association. Mr. O. L. Williams heard that Morris' hearse was being used in conjunction with Davis' hearse, and so telephoned Mr. Morris, who telephoned Mr. Williams to have the hearse returned at once. Mr. Martin Westbrook, secretary of the association at once proceeded to the house, where the funeral was being conducted, and ordered the driver to return to Norfolk. This the man refused to do, and when it became known what Mr. Westbrook's orders were there came near being trouble, but some more conservative ones stopped the argument and proceeded to the residence of Mayor Baird, who ordered an officer to go to the scene and prevent any trouble. After the funeral was over a warrant was sworn out for Mr. Westbrook's arrest, charging him with disorderly conduct. The case came up for hearing before Mayor Baird. The witnesses testified to the facts as stated above, except that one witness said that Mr. Westbrook ordered one of his men to get up on the hearse and drive it off. The driver ordered him not to attempt such a thing, and it was not done. His honor, after hearing what the witnesses present had to say, at the solicitation of Capt. Hopper, continued the case until today to get the statement of the driver of the hearse. The matter has caused much talk in the community, and there will no doubt be a large crowd present to hear his honor's decision.
