TWO TOUGH MEN.

MULDOON and KILRAIN were both in town for a short time yesterday. They were on their way to Lynchburg where an exhibition was to be given. A couple of weeks ago SULLIVAN stopped here on his way to Mississippi to stand trial. At that time in an interview with a Times reporter he expressed the greatest enmity towards MULDOON and that gentleman does not seem to have any love for the gentleman from Ireland.

Men who know MULDOON and SULLIVAN are looking forward to their next meeting with anticipations hardly second to those with which they waited for SULLIVAN's great ring battles. They know that should the champion fighter and his former trainer meet in a barroom, which is most likely, the chances are quite as much in favor of MULDOON getting the best of the encounter which would probably ensue, as they are in favor of the big bruiser knocking out his stalwart and active ex-friend. THE HOME OF COOPER.

Otsego Hall, the home of JAMES FENIMORE COOPER, the novelist, at Cooperstown, was destroyed by fire in 1853, two years after his death. The family built another building on a new site. In the course of time a new street was laid out by the village authorities, which included within its bounds the spot where the old hall once stood. There is no suitable monument to COOPER in the town which he made famous. A movement is on foot to erect one by public subscription. Meantime, and as a temporary memorial, the Trustees of the village have caused a huge boulder to be planted on the site of the hall on Fair street, and have surrounded it by an iron fence and have had cut upon a polished face of the stone an inscription which reads as follows: "On this site stood Otsego Hall, the home of JAMES FENIMORE COOPER, where he lived from 1834 to the day of his death, September, 1851. Built in 1798 by Judge William Cooper; destroyed by fire October, 1853."

SUBDUING A FIRE.
