A POLICE CENSUS WANTED.

Mr. J. E. TENNYSON, one of the census enumerators of Roanoke, gives it as his opinion that the returns, when fully made up, will show that this city has a population of 17,000.

This is better than could have been expected, taking into consideration the number of people who have not been enumerated. The TIMES has given attention to the matter, and this dozen, as well as many another, still go unenumerated.

This should not be so. Roanoke should go before the country with as large a population as she has a right to. Her business men should not allow themselves to be robbed. We have all along been claiming that the population of the city would reach 20,000 people, and that claim should not go unsubstantiated through any fault of ours.

If it does it will be a reflection upon us. People will say that we not only exaggerate our population, but we also exaggerate our business, our enterprise and the capabilities of the great Southwest section. And they will have a right to do so.

This being the case, THE TIMES moves that there should be a police census of Roanoke taken. The council has a right to authorize it and the expense would be as nothing when the advantage to be derived is taken into consideration. Let us have a police census by all means. No one knows better than a policeman where to find everyone and then the time will not be limited as was the case with the regular enumerators.

This suggestion should receive the thoughtful consideration of every citizen of Roanoke.

AS AN EDUCATIONAL CENTRE.

President DREIER, of Roanoke College, has the thanks of THE TIMES for a copy of his catalogue. It contains fifty-one pages and is handsomely illustrated. Roanoke College is an honor to the Southwest and a monument to the untiring energy of Professor DREIER and his supporters.
