SUING FOR NATURAL BRIDGE

Virginia's Greatest Wonder to be Made the Object of a Suit.

RICHMOND, Sept. 10.—Mr. Willis B. Smith, as counsel for J. W. Fisher, who sues for himself and all other stockholders of the Alleghany Coal and Iron Company and creditors thereof who will contribute to the cost of the litigation, yesterday brought in the Chancery Court against H. C. Parsons, the Iron-Gate Company, Natural Bridge Forest Company, Natural Bridge Park Association, and others.

The object of this suit is explained by counsel to be to recover all lands, bonds, notes, stocks, or other property of the Alleghany Company illegally conveyed to the officers, directors, or other persons with intent to defraud creditors or other persons of what they are or may be lawfully entitled to; to enforce against the directors and other officers of the company all liabilities incurred by improper management; to distribute the funds realized to the creditors and members of the company as their interests may appear; to recover specially as a portion of the company's assets the property known as the "Natural Bridge property," lying in Rockbridge county and embracing 700 acres, of an unpaid purchase money therefor; to set aside the conveyance thereof from the company to H. C. Parsons, and to declare the \$10,000 settled by him by delivery of the company's stock for which no money, lands or securities had been paid, still a lien on the property for the foregoing reasons, and because the sale of its most valuable assets for its own stock to its former president was not legal to declare his payment of an additional \$10,000 in a release by him of all claims against the company void; to attach any property of the non-residents who were directors or other officers of the company, and liable to have a receiver appointed, etc.
