CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—[Special]—Wheat, liquidation was again unfer way and resulted in a further decline, ruling weak most of the session. The bear interests were rather aggressive, and long wheat kept coming out at each decline. Prices declined at the opening about 1/4 @ 1/2 lower than yesterday's closing, and prices declined with only slight fluctuations 1/2 @ 1, December being weakest, then rallied 1/4 @ 1/2, but again became weak and sold off 1/4, fluctuating slightly and closed 1/2 @ 1 lower than yesterday. Corn, little more active and unsettled and weak and lower; a bear tone was in evidence to weakness in wheat, and to free selling by longs. The opening was at slight advance, after which the decline was recorded, when the market rallied selling up 1/4, eased off again, changed some and closed with a slight loss. Oats, fairly active, unsettled and lower. Weakness and decline in wheat and corn caused the market to open easy and prices to yield 3/4. There was good general buying on recession and a reaction of 1/4 @ 1 cent resulted. Later the market yielded 1/4 @ 1/2 but became firmer and closed steady, 1/2 @ 1/4 over yesterday's close. Mess pork, moderately active, opening 2 1/2 @ 6 lower, and few sales were made at slight rally. Later prices receded 1/4 @ 1/2, rallied 1/4 @ 1/2, but a bear close settled back to medium figures and closed rather steady. Lard, active active. Early in the day prices ruled 2 1/2 @ 5 lower. Later prices rallied 1/4 @ 1/2. Market closed at medium figures. Short ribs, fairly active, fluctuating considerably within a small range and the market closed about outside figures.
