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WINSTON.

WINSTON, April 28.—[Special]—The big engines for the Roanoke and Southern road arrived here yesterday, and they are "daistes" too.

The board of aldermen have sold the second hundred thousand dollars' worth of Winston bonds for improvements to a banking firm in Baltimore.

The tobacco manufacturers of Winston are now in the midst of a busy season. They have all disposed of the goods worked last year, and in consequence they are now "hustling" to keep up with orders. Most of them complain of the scarcity of laborers, notwithstanding darkies are arriving here on every train from Virginia, and other States, to find employment in the factories.

The Roanoke and Southern Railroad Company has just secured an option, which in all probability means a sale, on some valuable property near their depot. This is done for the purpose of giving an outlet for the Southern extension of the road and making room for a larger yard for shifting and placing cars. The continued increase of business on the road demands more room for the above purpose.

RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, Va., April 28.—[Special]—An unknown white girl, who bore appearances of a worthy ancestry, was found last night wandering about the streets in a demented condition and was taken to the almshouse. In reply to questions to-day she said that her name was Jessie Miller; that she was the daughter of an Episcopal clergyman of Independence, Mo., and on a piece of paper found in her pocket was written her name—Martha Lou Turner.

Let Rizenhook, who was run over by a Richmond and Petersburg engine last night and terribly mangled, severing both of his legs from his body, died an agonizing death this evening.


