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A \$5,000 DREAM.

Capt. William Woolling Receives a Check for Money Loaned Years Ago.

Capt. William Woolling, formerly of Lynchburg, but now a resident of this city, regards himself as a very lucky man. He was for many years a captain of a boat on the James River and Kanawha canal, where he saved considerable money. Fifteen years ago he loaned a friend, a hotel-keeper in Philadelphia, \$10,000 which was never repaid.
