Cold Winds Chill the Baseball Enthusiasm.

Philadelphia Loses in Favor of Chicago in the Ninth Inning—The Giants Play a Close Game With the Pittsburgh and Win—Boston Beats Cleveland—Association Games—Yesterday's Events of the Turf.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 8.—[Special]—The home team jumped on Terry's delivery right at the start to-day. They did all their business in the first two innings, however. In the first inning, with Captain Latham on third and McPherson on first, Bug Holliday sent a hot ball between Ward's legs and Latham scored. Browning bunted and beat the ball to first. With the bases filled Marr hit to third, Pickney threw wildly to first, and McPherson scored, Holliday was caught at the home plate, Browning scored on Smith's hit to left and Marr scored when Harrington forced Smith at second. In the second inning the home club kept up the slaughter. Rhines hit for two bases.

Latham sacrificed, and when he was declared out he made such a vigorous protest that he was ordered out of the game, and Radbourn took his place. THE STORM IN TEXAS.

A Small Fishing Boat Destroyed and Six of the Crew Drowned.

GALVESTON, Tex., July 8.—[Special]—The loss on Galveston island from Sunday night's storm did not amount to more than \$1,500. The citizens were more scared than hurt. The fishing smack Danica, commanded by Captain Robert Frankovich, was wrecked off Smith's Point, on the other side of Galveston bay, during the squall Monday morning, and five of the six men aboard of her were drowned. Those drowned are Robert Frankovich, Frank Millovich, Peter Strangel, Jack Spech and an unknown man. News of the terrible disaster was brought to the city Monday evening by Vincent Sagovich, the sole survivor of the little craft. The sloop Matro left last night to search for the bodies of the unfortunate men.

INVESTIGATING THE WRECK.

The Evidence Tends to Show Carelessness on the Part of the Officials. RAVENNA, O., July 8.—[Special]—The coroner's inquest, investigating the recent Erie wreck, was continued this morning. S. C. Arnold, of Kent, testified that the freight train left Kent almost immediately after the passenger train had pulled out, and that when the freight was under way the express was not more than 200 feet ahead of it. The speed recorded on the freight train showed that the train ran the first three miles at the rate of 20 miles an hour, the fourth 28 miles and fifth and sixth at the rate of 30 miles an hour.
