

THE CITY COUNCIL IN SESSION.

Councilman Huff Gets in His Work.

He Monopolizes the Time of the Council With Resolutions, Speeches and New Ordinances—Much Routine Business Disposed of—The Action on the North Jefferson Street Extension Re-considered on Motion of Mr. Eckloff.

The meeting of the City Council last night was characterized by wrangling and speeches by Mr. Huff. He offered fully two-thirds of the resolutions and when he was not offering resolutions he was occupying the time of the Council by making speeches.

The report of the clerk of the market house showed a total of \$819 collected.

Mr. Thomas, finance committee, reported in favor of giving Messrs. Wilson, Colston & Co., of Baltimore, renewal of option on \$50,000 worth of city bonds until November 15th, at par, with accrued interest, one-half the interest to be paid the company. Referred back to the finance committee.

Mr. Huff, committee on health, reported that committee had made a trip over the city and found it to be in a good sanitary condition. The committee made several recommendations which were preferred to proper committees.

On motion of Mr. McConnell the lamp post at the corner of Jefferson street and Railroad avenue was ordered to be removed.

On motion of Mr. Eckloff the bill of Dr. Gray, coroner of the city, was approved. A bill for \$981 for sewer work was also approved.

An ordinance was adopted making it a misdemeanor for any one, except firemen and people authorized by fire and water committee, to open fire plugs in the city and use the water.

The ordinance creating the office of building inspector was referred back to the ordinance committee.

The Baltimore United Oil Company was instructed to build a wall around their premises 13 inches thick, 30 feet above ground and 1 1/2 feet below the ground. The recent order of Council to have the plant declared a nuisance was repealed.

On motion of Mr. Eckloff the vote of the last Council in regard to the grading of Jefferson street, between Patten and Harrison streets, was reconsidered and the work ordered done.

Mr. Huff introduced an ordinance, that whenever policemen made an arrest on a State warrant they be paid for and same and the money turned in to the city treasury. Referred to the ordinance committee.

Mr. Huff introduced an ordinance, making it unlawful to sell or give intoxicating liquors to minors, which was adopted.

Petitions were presented from citizens in different parts of the city asking to have streets and sidewalks graded, which were referred to the street committee.

The proposition of Wilson Wertz to lay 130 feet of brick walk on Park street, between Center street and Third avenue, if the city would grade same, was accepted.

The request of Wm. F. Sidelinger to erect a small iron building on Jefferson street, to be used as a photograph gallery, was refused.

A letter was read from Colonel Pope in regard to a sewer at the Boulevard and F street, which was referred to the sewer committee.

On motion of Mr. Camp gas lamps were ordered to be placed on the corner of Luck and Grove streets, two on Luck street between Lewis and Roanoke streets, one on Sixth avenue between Park and Lewis streets, one on the corner of Sixth avenue and Lewis street, and one on the corner of Bullitt and Borden streets.

A letter was read from the city engineer recommending that gutters on Church street be paved with cobblestones three feet wide, to cost \$250, which was reported to street committee. Committee then adjourned.

WHEAT MOVING.

The Norfolk and Western Handling Much Local and Western Grain.

Wheat has begun to move on the Norfolk and Western and the single elevator at Norfolk is being taxed to its utmost capacity. It is estimated that the wheat traffic is double that of any preceding year in the history of the road.

About eighty car loads is being shipped through Roanoke each day for Norfolk. Half of this is estimated as coming from the West and the remainder is local shipments from Southwest Virginia and Tennessee. The Western wheat is shipped over the Clinch Valley road by way of Norton.

All the cars and other rolling stock fit for service is being used by the road at present as the freight traffic seems to have increased in everything.

The Hospital.

A meeting of the committee on real estate and building of the Roanoke Hospital Association was held in the rooms of the Commercial Association yesterday evening to hear the report of the sub-committee on the purchase of a lot from the Roanoke Gas and Water Company on which to erect the buildings. The board will meet again next Saturday afternoon at the same place to hear the report of the same committee, when the purchase of the lot will probably be ratified.

Prevented by the Rain.

Owing to the inclement weather the lawn party given by the Ladies' Aid Society of the Second Episcopal Church, which was to have been continued last night, will be given to-night at the same place, Mrs. Word's lawn on Roanoke street, opposite Baptist Church. Should the weather then be unfavorable they will hold it in some place, which will be made known in the afternoon paper and by hand bills. A pleasant time is assured for all.

The Engineeers Meet.

The annual meeting of the General Board of Adjustment of the Norfolk and Western engineers has been in session in this city for the past two days. This board is composed of members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and includes one member from each division of the road. It is really a grievance committee of the engineers and holds a session annually. The meetings are secret. E. H. Reams was elected chairman and C. E. Teuch, secretary.

All of Them Fined.

Thomas Mann and Thomas Frewer, two stonecutters, and Bernard Berlin and Kerl Minnick, were before the Mayor yesterday morning to answer for the disturbance created on Commerce street. Mann was fined \$1, for striking Berlin and the others were assessed \$2.50 each for being drunk and disorderly. No action was taken about the \$20 which was alleged to have been stolen, and which was found on the person of Minnick. The money belonged to Frewer.

A New Schedule.

A new schedule will go into effect on the Norfolk and Western August 30. The change will not be very radical, and it is not known how the change will affect the present running of trains. Superintendents Hardy, Mahar, Osborne and Cassell were in consultation with the general manager yesterday, but have not yet completed their work.
