

TRINITY STAR COURSE.

THE CITY SURVEY.

A Detail Statement of the Work Already Completed.

The most satisfactory piece of work that has been accomplished in the city engineer's office for a long time is that done on the city survey.

Mr. George P. Wood is the engineer in charge of the survey, and he is attending to the minute details in a most careful manner.

The entire system is composed of twenty quadrilaterals and thirteen triangles. These are formed by a combination of forty-six stations that will hereafter be referred to by number.

Three base lines, situated at the extremities of the main system, have been measured. These have been named with respect to their positions—the south, east and west basis.

Station 34, situated north of Eighth ave. s. w. and in the line of Commerce street was selected as the most convenient place to take the observations necessary for the establishment of a true meridian.

The method of observation gave rise to certain rigid conditions, to be fulfilled by the angles about the stations. These conditions are that an angle must be equal to the sum of its parts and the sum of the angles about the station must equal 360 degrees.

The length of sides has been computed by the sine rule, all computations being carefully checked. The latitude and departure of the various parts of the system have been computed, and from that the rectangular co-ordinates of the stations.

The accuracy of the system was tested by many very severe tests. Of these the following are of the most important: The length of the east base, as computed from the west base through the main system, varies from its measured length by 0.197 feet, which is to the length of base as one in 14,128.

angulation system at this time will be very beneficial to the survey. The work can now be checked as it proceeds, and the fact that it will be checked by comparison with an accurate triangulation system cannot be too highly appreciated.

The cost of the survey up to January 1 is \$4,627.62, divided as follows: Triangulation survey, \$965.48; skeleton survey, \$1,400.99; detail survey, \$252.06; writing abstracts of deeds and filing same, \$518; instruments and tools, \$760.19; stationery, \$102.64; transportation, \$24.35; lumber for base measurement, \$25.93; steel and wooden hubs, stakes, etc., \$96.09; stone monuments, \$209.96; office rent, fuel and lights, \$61.60; furniture and office fixtures, \$197.08; incidental expenses, \$22.35; total incidental expenses, \$1,560.19; pay roll, \$3,137.43.

A SHOOTING AFFAIR.

Robert Pruitt Dangerously Shot by J. D. Barksdale.

Robert Pruitt, a colored man who assists Foreman Dyerle in running the chain-gang, was shot and dangerously injured by J. D. Barksdale, a former employe of the city, yesterday morning about 7 o'clock.

Pruitt is an industrious negro and lives in Old Lick. He started for work yesterday morning, and when opposite Rev. W. W. Brown's house he heard some one running up behind him. He turned and saw Barksdale. Just as he did so the latter fired. The ball struck Pruitt in the left breast and ranged upward against the collar, where it lodged.

Pruitt grabbed his assailant, and knocking him down, was beating his face with a rock when some men came up and ordered him to stop. Pruitt then took hold of Barksdale's collar and was taking him to the station-house when he became so weak from the loss of blood he had to let him go.

Pruitt was carried to police headquarters, where his wound was dressed by Drs. Buckner and Strickland, but the ball was not extracted. The wounded man claims that the shooting was the result of an old grudge between Barksdale and himself. Justice Williams yesterday afternoon set Barksdale's preliminary hearing for Saturday.


