

MINNESOTA PUSH.

World's Fair Building to Be Erected by the Enterprising State. The Italian renaissance adopted for the design of Minnesota's building for the world's fair is in harmony with the other structures now planned for the exposition grounds, and for the position awarded to Minnesota it seems to be the style best adapted to carry out the ideas of the general commission.

The framework is to be of wood covered with staff to give the effect and character of stone construction. The entrance is through a portico having rusticated dome columns, and

on the entablature over the center the name of Minnesota will appear in a raised panel. At the extremities of the uncovered platforms at either side of the portico are statues on square pedestals representing the original owners of the country and the early settlers of the state, the Indian on one side and the pioneer lumberman with his ax and rifle on the other. Over the roof of the portico can be stretched an awning to afford shelter as a smoking loggia and place of observation. In the spandrels of the arches of the loggia between the two wings are shields with the coats of arms of the state of Minnesota and of the United States.

Entering the building directly into the main exhibition hall, which is 69x79 feet, space is afforded for the display of the state's resources. The hall is 18 feet high and will give opportunity for a symmetrical and attractive arrangement of cases and exhibits. A broad flight of stairs starting opposite the main entrance leads to a landing which has a domed semi-circular alcove, with a seat for resting place. Under the stairs are the coat and check-rooms, and on the right of the staircase a superintendent's room, with toilet room, and connecting by passage under the stairs with the rooms for the bureau of information and post office on the other side of the building. Over these two suites, in a Messianic story, are two double and two single rooms for the employes, with bathrooms attached.

This arrangement requires two short flights of stairs, but the employes' rooms are near their work and are entirely out of sight. The main stairs, running in two flights from the laundry, enter the large reception hall, which is made the most imposing in effect of all the second-story rooms.

The grand hall is a symmetrical room with a colonnade at the rear opening on the staircase and at the front by an archway and passage opening to the loggia and balcony. On either side are the reception rooms devoted to the ladies and gentlemen. On the front corner, which is also the street corner, is a room for the board of commissioners. The room for the ladies' auxiliary board is in front. The ladies' reading room is connected by double doors with the reception rooms, and in the rear of this suite are toilet rooms. Two guests' rooms are provided in the rear of the ladies' apartments, which are entered through a private hallway.

EMILIO CASTELAR.

The Talented Leader of the Republican Party of Spain. Emilio Castelar, the famous orator of Spain, is still a force in Spanish politics, his present attitude being opposition within parliamentary limits to the existing moderate monarchy. He had paved the way by his writings and his speeches for the revolution of 1868, which was put down by Serrano; as one of the leaders of the revolt he was condemned to death, but made his escape to Geneva; he returned during the

troubles of 1868, when Isabel II. was dethroned, and labored for the adoption of a republican form of government, but the throne was reestablished in 1870 with Amadeo as king; when the latter abdicated in 1873, Castelar became minister of foreign affairs to the republic, and in September of that year he was made president. His measures for suppressing the Carlist insurrection and harmonizing conflicting interests did not succeed; on January 3, 1874, he resigned, Serrano came to the front in the military reaction, and a year later, when Alfonso XII. was called to the throne, Castelar made a second journey to Geneva. In 1876 he reentered the cortes; he has since taken an active part in the political debates. To a history of the Columbus epoch he brings scholarship of a special character; the chair of history and philosophy at the University of Madrid was filled by him for many years until he resigned it in 1875. His democratic principles and his admiration for American institutions, says the Century, have served to keep him in sympathy with the civilization of the new world.
