COUNTY COURT.

The July Term Commenced Yesterday.

The July term of Roanoke county court commenced yesterday morning, Judge Griffin presiding. In the absence of the county clerk, E. A. McCauley qualified as deputy.

The following grand jury were sworn: John P. Gwaltney, foreman; Daniel Kittenger, W. L. Williamson, Lewis Kirkwood, D. A. Brumbaugh, John Burk, Eugene Boon, James Kissler and John Bradley, who returned three indictments against John Alburn for selling liquor without license, also one against James Miles, petit larceny for stealing a cow and another for carrying concealed weapons. In the case of Noah F. Wertz vs. Jefferson Massettler for unlawful detainer, on motion of the plaintiff the case was continued at the cost of the defendant. An attachment was gotten out by the Keith-Schroeder Harness Company against C. B. Strouse. George C. L. Hill, a former citizen of Great Britain, declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States and took the oath. The report of the commissioners in the case of the Roanoke Street Railway Company versus George Stevens' heirs was returned. The will of Christian Swartz was admitted to probate. Witnesses: James A. Garst and Carlton D. Lemon. Appraisers: John Garst, James Garst, Abram E. Eller, Jeremiah Garst and F. A. Eller.

In the case of commonwealth versus Branch Allen, for assault and battery upon a negro woman some months ago, defendant pleaded not guilty, and after hearing the evidence and speeches of counsel the jury returned the following verdict: "We, the jury, find the defendant not guilty as alleged in the indictment." Pugh & Moffett defended; commonwealth represented by Major Ballard.

BREVITIES.

Miss Laura Henning left yesterday morning to visit friends in Radford.

Yesterday morning before Justices Camper and Coon, George Hofanger, of Cave Spring, was tried upon a warrant gotten out by his son, W. H. Hofanger, charging him with unlawfully and maliciously threatening to kill and poison several of his family and with firing off a pistol in his house on July 11th. After hearing several witnesses the justices bound defendant in the sum of \$200 with one surety (A. J. Phelps) in the like sum, to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for twelve months, and in addition to pay the costs of \$10.75. J. S. Baer represented the defendant, W. M. Montgomery prosecuted.

Mrs. Wade, wife of the physician in charge of the Keeley Institute, has joined her husband and is registered at Hotel Lucerne.

Deputy Sergeant Finke early yesterday morning arrested Peter Archer, colored, at the furnace, who is wanted for shooting another negro in the leg at Elkhorn. When the officer approached him he was unloading a car with four others, but upon being told to consider himself under arrest, remarked, "Dar, Lord!" and went to jail without any resistance. Sergeant Frier telegraphed news of the arrest to the sheriff of McDowell county, W. Va., who will no doubt come here after him.

Sunday morning at 7 a. m. a party, consisting of J. A. Thomasson, G. P. Gilmore, Leonard Wilson and W. O. Johnson, left Salem on their bicycles for Radford. When about three miles from town Johnson's wheel broke down and he had to foot it home. The other three kept on, taking breakfast at Big Spring and reaching Radford at 1:30 p. m. for dinner. At Radford Jack Thomasson's bicycle was broken by an obliging friend and he returned home by train. Gilmore and Wilson left Radford at 4:30 p. m., took supper at Big Spring and reached Salem at 11 p. m. The distance from Salem to Radford by road is said to be forty miles.

Octave Blache and wife, of New Orleans, are registered at Hotel Lucerne, from the Roanoke Red Sulphur Springs. At a meeting of the county Democratic committee Monday at noon, Capt. Rogers in the chair, the following resolution was passed: Resolved, That a mass meeting be held at Salem, August 15th, court day, at noon, for the purpose of electing delegates to the Democratic convention, to be held at Lynchburg, August 26. The districts will on that day elect delegates and alternates as follows: Salem district, five each; Big Lick; four of each; Cave Spring, one of each; Catawba, one of each; all of which shall be ratified by the mass meeting.

Mrs. C. F. Reed, in company with her brother, C. T. Campbell, superintendent of the Southern Express, left a few days ago for Chattanooga, to visit her niece, Mrs. F. M. Garza. William Hannah left last night for Newport News, where he will run a branch establishment for Mr. McAllister.

LONDON, July 18.—Lunt and Wilson, the clerks who organized an alleged syndicate for speculations in cotton, and victimized a number of firms, including the old and prominent house of Isaac Cooke & Sons, have been committed on charges of embezzlement and forgery. Wied, at New Wied, on the Rhine. King Oscar, of Sweden, visited her there a few days ago. He found her still shattered in health, but well enough to read to him her last poem, contrasting the happiness of Prince Oscar's unruly wife with the misery of Mlle. Vaccresco, the young woman who tried to capture Crown Prince Ferdinand, of Roumania, but has been condemned to seeing diplomacy carry him off and engage him to Princess Marie, of Edinburgh.

The queen still bemoans the disappointed love of her favorite lady-in-waiting, and has not been reconciled to her husband since he utterly refused, upon the advice of his cabinet, to countenance the match between Mlle. Vaccresco and the crown prince. The queen informed the Swedish king that she was writing a long poem, in which she would depict the sorrows of Mlle. Vaccresco, the disappointment of Crown Prince Ferdinand over the thwarting of his first true love and the advantages of allowing princes, like other men, to follow their own bent in selecting their wives, as did Prince Oscar, of Sweden.

Princess Marie, of Edinburgh, will hardly be edified by reading in this poem when it shall appear that her future husband is supposed to love still another woman.

LOUISIANA'S BUILDING.

It Will Be Modeled After the Old Colonial Plantation House.

Plans for the Louisiana world's fair building have just been completed. The style of the structure will be the old colonial plantation house. A great many works of art by Louisianians have

Lumbermen of the state have practically agreed to furnish the building material, but it appears that a great deal of money will have to be raised by private subscription before the erection of the pavilion will be assured.

Senator Vance as a Humorist.

Senator Vance has the reputation of being a humorist. It is a fatal reputation. "Sunset" Cox used to say that it ruined his future. As Mr. Vance has no ambition beyond the senate, and as humorous speeches there have made him rather popular with his people, he can afford to be "funny." Senator Gray spent part of last summer abroad. Mrs. Gray accompanied him. On a steamboat on Lake Lucerne he encountered Senator Vance, who came up behind him as he stood near the rail and, touching him on the shoulder, greeted him most cordially. When the usual greetings had passed between them, Senator Vance asked: "Well, as Sandy said, are you traveling for pleasure or is the good wife along?" Senator Gray's embarrassment will be understood when it is known that Mrs. Gray sat within three feet of him, an amusee listener to the conversation.

Not Obligated to Believe Everything.

The dean of Norwich in a recent speech told this story to illustrate the new criticism as it appears among the middle classes: A worthy timber merchant announced that he was relieved to find that he need not believe literally the various passages in the Bible which he had often proved to be impossible. Being pressed to name one of these passages, he mentioned the ark. It was, he understood, 450 feet long, 70 feet broad, and 45 feet high, and was filled with live animals. He was convinced, therefore, that the Israelites could not have carried it about with them for forty years!

A Return Blow on Buttes.

Henry Durant, the founder of Wellesley college for women, and a very well known lawyer in New England, studied law in Butler's office when a young man, and was admitted to the bar on his recommendation. On one occasion Butler and Durant were opponents in a case, and the contest was very heated. Butler suddenly turned to the court and said: "It is the chief regret of my life that I recommended that young man for admission to the bar." Durant, as quick as a flash, replied: "Your honor, it is the great wonder of my life that his recommendation had any weight with the court."

At Pressure at the Cannon's Mouth.

Experiments, our correspondent says, were made during the last trial trip of the armed cruiser Deowulf to determine the air-pressure at the mouth of a gun at the moment of discharge. Rabbits were placed near the muzzles of the guns, and shots fired. In every case the animals fell dead at once. In order to test the probable effects of the enormous displacement of air upon human beings, figures made of straw were used. These were torn to pieces in every instance. The trials were made with long-bored twenty-four centimeter ring guns.
