DR. GEORGE'S LECTURE.

He Describes the Habits and Costumes of the People.

Rev. Dr. George, a native of Armenia, delivered a very interesting lecture last night, at the Calvary Baptist church, on "Armenia and the Garden of Eden" to a fairly good and very appreciative audience. He began the lecture by singing "Abide with Me" in his native language. Dr. George then described the country and scenery of Armenia. A vivid description was given of the inhabitants, their customs, religions, etc.

In conclusion he said he had come to this country to educate himself and had no money. He went to New Jersey and made an application to enter school and offered to work his way through. This proposition was accepted and he worked for several years until he graduated and received his diploma. Since then he has been preaching and lecturing and has now put in an application before the Southern Board to go as a medical missionary to Armenia to convert the poor, illiterate, ignorant and degraded people to the true religion of God.

Mr. George then arrayed himself in the Armenian costume, which consisted of a dark blue flannel robe reaching to his knees, a broad sash of light material wrapped around his waist and a scarf of still lighter material around his neck.

Generally Condemned.

The third trial of John Smith for the murder of Peter Alif was begun in the Hastings Court of Roanoke Monday, before Judge J. S. Diggs, and a Lynchburg jury. Messrs. Phlegar, Berkeley and Johnson appeared for the defense, and Commonwealth's Attorney Hardaway was assisted in the prosecution by Capt. L. A. Sale, of Bedford City. The trial closed Wednesday evening, the jury, after being out an hour, bringing in a verdict of murder in the second degree, and fixing his punishment at six years in the penitentiary. It is only just to the people of Roanoke to add that the verdict is generally condemned.
