COUNTY COURT. The December Term Opened Yesterday at Salem.

The December term of Roanoke county court convened yesterday, Judge Griffin presiding, and the following business was transacted: C. I. Preston, foreman; W. H. Barnett, J. H. Peck, W. C. Good, C. F. Read, G. W. Parrish, F. A. Roberts, W. B. Troy and J. G. Tinnell were empanelled and sworn a grand jury (special) and returned the following indictments: Samuel Markham, Henry Moffett and Ed. Williams, for house breaking, two indictments, viz: stealing chickens from the hen house of John O. Jack and Mrs. Pollard in Vinton about a month ago; William Shaver, indicted for housebreaking and felony, two indictments for stealing chickens belonging to Henry Noel, colored, in West Salem; Harry Cain, colored, indicted for felonious wounding of Homer Clements, colored; Jerry Moore and Tom Williams alias Little Tom, indicted for housebreaking and entering the store of Duncan & Cumpston.

The case of Jerry Moore and Tom Williams was called, the prisoners arraigned and pleaded "not guilty." It was then continued for the defendants and witnesses recognized.

Samuel Markham and Henry Moffett were then tried for breaking into the henhouse of J. O. Jack, of Vinton. Prisoners were arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Jury sworn as follows: W. G. Hurt, W. P. Deaton, G. W. Hartman, E. M. Gross, W. H. Burch, Joseph H. Owens, J. H. Carbaugh, John Burks, J. M. Moore, John E. Bradley, J. H. Phlegar and J. P. Stanley. The court appointed W. M. Montgomery to defend the prisoners. After hearing the evidence the jury retired and brought in a verdict of guilty, fixing the terms of imprisonment at two years in the penitentiary for each prisoner.

Samuel Markham and Henry Moffett were then arraigned for breaking into the hen house of Mrs. Pollard, an aged lady of Vinton, to which they pleaded not guilty. The following jury was sworn: A. W. Littrell, J. W. Graham, J. O. Thomas, Alex. Moses, H. A. Forsyth, John N. Whitesell, S. F. Clement, John L. Hannah, John Humphreys, John H. Rhodes, J. W. Hypes and C. J. H. Coffman. In this case the jury brought in a verdict of guilty, fixing the terms of imprisonment at five years each in the penitentiary. The court appointed Mr. J. Ed. Allemong to defend the prisoners in this case.

Since last term of the court 100 deeds have been admitted to record.
