VIRGINIA NOTES.

Franklin L. Hervey's stable at Chase City was destroyed by fire early Friday morning. Loss, \$1,500; insurance, \$500.

It was reported that Mrs. Linden Kent, of Washington, D. C., has donated \$60,000 to the University of Virginia to endow a chair of English and rhetoric.

Dr. Charles W. Coleman and Mrs. L. W. Lane, while driving from Toano to Plum Point, last Thursday night, were thrown from the vehicle and both badly hurt.

Charles M. Downing, a well-known young man of Portsmouth, eldest son of Mrs. Fannie Murdaugh Downing, the authoress, died Thursday night at the home of the family after a lingering illness from consumption.

George H. Bagwell died Thursday morning near Cherrystone, in the lower part Northampton, aged about 63 years.

James Painter and two young sons of Peter C. Painter, Ernest and Harvey, who live in Page county, near Alma, were Thursday bitten by a dog that undoubtedly had rabies.
