FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

New York Stock Market. NEW YORK, June 13.—The stock market was even duller than usual today. The dealings were almost entirely professional and as the feeling among the traders on the board is still bearish a further decline in prices was recorded, but not a heavy one, ranging from 1/4 to 1 1/2 percent, latter in General Electric, which sold down to 70 3/4, the principal drives were against this stock, Chicago Gas, Sugar, Atchison, Western Union, Reading, Northern Pacific preferred and Grangers. During the afternoon the supply of money on call increased and the rate declined from 10 to 3 percent. On this smaller shorts attempted to cover and prices improved 1/4 to 1 1/2 percent.

The feature of the rally was the comparatively light offerings. The fast advance made progress. Taken together it was an uncommonly quiet and featureless session. The market closed firm in tone; sales listed: stocks, 150,000; unlisted, 13,000; sub-treasury balances: coin, \$67,380,000; currency, \$18,971,000.

THE WEATHER.

Bulletin For the Week Ending Monday, June 13. LYNCHBURG, June 13.—During the past seven days the temperature has averaged only very slightly above the normal for the season. There has been generally more than the average amount of sunshine. There has been more than the normal amount of rainfall in the southwest and on the coast; there has been about the normal amount in the central and northern sections and in the valley, while over the Tidewater section and the southern counties there has been little or no rain.

Reports from all other sections are generally favorable, except that wet weather has caused some rust on wheat in the extreme northern section. Wheat is generally reported as in good condition; it is nearly ready for harvest in the central sections, while harvest was begun in Mecklenburg county on the 12th inst. Clover cutting has begun around Staunton. Oats are reported poor in the southeast, but are good in the western and southwestern sections. Grass is generally in good condition. Corn is doing well, and that which had to be replanted is said to have a good stand. Tobacco is reported in fair to good condition. The potato crop is said to be very fine in the eastern section. The peanut crop now has a very good stand and generally doing well. Apples are said to be falling off badly in Highland, Warren and Spotsylvania counties, and in Page county the rose bugs are slightly injuring the fruit. On the whole the crops are in fair condition and the weather conditions have been very favorable to the growing crops and for the cultivation of them.

THE BRITANNIA WON.

But the Valkyrie Broke the Jaws of Her Gaff and Did Not Finish. LONDON, June 13.—The first match to be sailed off Dover between the yachts Valkyrie, Britannia, Caluina and Iverna took place yesterday. The race was sailed in rounds. In the first round the Britannia and Valkyrie took a long lead of the other contestants, and the round practically laid between these two cutters. These boats finished the round within three seconds of each other, and, as according to the rule the Britannia had to allow the Valkyrie about a minute, the latter won her round. The final round was then sailed. The Britannia won the race and the cup valued at £50, given by the Duke of Connaught. The Caluina was second on time allowance and the Iverna third. The Valkyrie broke the jaws on her gaff about six miles out and she did not attempt to finish the race.

MRS. GRUBB WILL BE HOST.

She Will be Well Enough to Give a Reception to Eulalia. TRENTON, June 13.—Mrs. Grubb, wife of General E. Burd Grubb, ex-Minister to Spain, who is now convalescent at her country seat, Edgewater Park, on the banks of the Delaware, will entertain the Infanta Eulalia at Tuxedo on the return of the royal visitor from Chicago. Dr. William Pepper, of Philadelphia, and Dr. A. W. Taylor, of Beverly, N. J., have decided that, if the present improvement continues, Mrs. Grubb will be able to have the proposed reception.

A GRAND DUKE'S DEATH.

The Brother of the Empress of Austria Ruptures a Cardiac Artery. VIENNA, June 13.—Another severe affliction has fallen upon the imperial house of Austria. Duke Maximilian Emmanuel, brother of Empress Elizabeth, while returning to Munich from a ride this morning ruptured a cardiac artery and died almost immediately. Duke Maximilian Emmanuel was the youngest surviving son of the late Maximilian, "Duke in Bavaria," who died in November, 1888, at the age of 80. He was born at Munich on December 7, 1849, and was married in September, 1875, to the Princess Amalia, of Saxe-Coburg Gotha, by whom he has had two sons. He was a lieutenant-general on the Prussian staff and a chevalier of the Austrian Order of the Golden Fleece.

THE BORDEN TRIAL.

Miss Borden Much Affected by the Testimony. NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 13.—Another big crowd was present this morning and seats in the courtroom were all occupied some time before the court opened. Miss Borden made her appearance ten minutes before the justices took their seats. Counsel held a short consultation with the justices in their room prior to the latter's taking their seats. Mr. Adams continued the cross-examination of Dr. Dolan, who described the position of the bodies and the blood spots, and said the blows came from the left and right, and were of moderate force. The prisoner sat with closed eyes and a fan over her face. Continuing, Dr. Dolan said that the blows were made by a sharp instrument, and some on Mrs. Borden by an assailant astride the body. A jurymen was taken sick and a recess of five minutes was taken. The prisoner was so affected that she was led from the room.

Requisition for a Virginia Official.

CRISFIELD, Md., June 13.—Mr. Harry Waters, State's attorney, has asked Governor Brown for a requisition for Captain Gaskins, of the Virginia fishery force, who shot Isaac Sterling some time ago. Justice Horsey, of Crisfield, has taken the affidavit of Isaac Sterling and Mr. Wilson and forwarded them to Mr. Waters. Captain Gaskins was tried in Virginia, but it is held that the shooting was done in Maryland and that the trial should take place in this State. A true bill was found against Captain Gaskins by the grand jury last April.

The President of France Ill.

PARIS, June 13.—President Carnot has been slightly ill to day in consequence of his attending the race for the grand prize yesterday. He was quite exhausted when he reached home last evening. He slept poorly, and to day has been weak and somewhat feverish. Dr. Potain and Dr. Panchou have ordered him to take a complete rest. He probably will postpone or give up entirely the journey that he planned to make to Brittany.

D. B. Prettyman Arrested in Delaware.

DOVER, Del., June 13.—D. H. Prettyman, of Seaford, white, aged fifty-five years, was arrested this morning and lodged in jail for criminally assaulting an eight-year-old girl, named Ricketts, near Seaford, on Friday, since which time he has eluded the officers. The physician in attendance states that the child is in a critical condition. Prettyman has always borne a good reputation. The penalty in this State for such an offense is death.

VIRGINIA NOTES.

The wheat crop throughout the southwest is looking fine. Major H. C. Wood, who was hurt in the late cyclone in Bristol is out again and will soon be well. Mrs. Ibble McKeehan, of Gapp Run, Tenn., will complete her 100th year in July and a centennial celebration will be given in honor of the event. The Sam Jones meetings began at Winchester on Saturday night in the large tabernacle on the Shenandoah Valley fair grounds. William E. Mitchell, a jealous husband, made a sensational attempt to kill his wife Sunday night while she was attending a children's concert in a Methodist Episcopal Church in South Boston.

A mass-meeting of Democrats has been called for to-night to decide whether there shall be a primary election held to nominate a candidate for postmaster of Danville.

Representative Swanson got two places for people in his district yesterday: France, of Henry county, a messenger's position in the government printing office, and Tomlinson, of Grayson county, a place in the Agricultural Department.

A private telegram received from Minneapolis yesterday stated that the Supreme Council, Royal Arcanum, in session there, had re-elected H. H. C. Miller supreme regent and that Hon. William Lovenstein, of Richmond, had been unanimously re-elected a member of the committee on appeals.

On the Portsmouth side of the Norfolk harbor a syndicate has secured the price named for the property being \$150,000 an option on all the water front between the corporate line of the city and the Naval Hospital grounds, and it is said that the construction of extensive steamship docks and warehouses are in contemplation.

Dr. J. M. Jordan, the second son of Col. W. J. Jordan, of Newbern, and a brother of Prof. T. W. Jordan, of Knoxville University, and J. R. Jordan, ex-United States Marshall for this district, died on Wednesday last from cancer of the stomach. He had been a sufferer from the disease for over a year but had been able to attend to business until a few weeks ago. He is the third son Col. Jordan has lost after they attained the age of manhood.

The William White farm of 275 acres, near Buena Vista, Rockbridge county, has been sold to Mr. Jennings, of Carroll county, Md., for \$6,151.

Robert C. Skaggs, one of the most prominent citizens of Monroe county, W. Va., died last week.

The Brewing Company's Charter.

The amended charter of the Virginia Brewing Company, as granted by Judge Woods, was filed in the clerk's office yesterday. The stockholders petition that in addition to the manufacture of beer and bottling the same they be allowed to manufacture ginger ale, soda, mineral water and other soft drinks. This was decided on at a meeting of the stockholders May 30.
