ANARCHY HONORED.

The Fame of the Haymarket Bomb Throwers Perpetuated in Granite.

CHICAGO, June 26.—The unveiling of the granite monument to the memory of the five anarchists, August Spies, Albert Parsons, Adolph Fischer, Louis Lingg and George Engel, which took place at Waldheim cemetery, was an impressive ceremony. More than 2,500 people assembled at the burial ground to stamp once more with their approval the sentiment and actions of the men whom the state of Illinois found guilty of treason and put to death.

He Carved His Wife.

ASHLAND, Wis., June 26.—Albert Saunders, a colored waiter who cut his wife's throat in Duluth Friday, was captured on the steamer City of Duluth after an exciting chase. After the vessel left Duluth the fugitive kept firing at the officers as long as his ammunition held out and then offered to cut their throats if they came near. He was smuggled in the hold of the boat, and it took some time to capture him.

Child Killed by a Cow.

PITTSBURGH, June 26.—Frankie Ludwick, the 6-year-old son of F. E. Ludwick, residing at 236 High street, Allegheny, followed his father to the stable to see a calf which was stabled with the cow. At sight of Mr. Ludwick and his son the cow became enraged and rushed at them.

Governor McKinney at Deer Park.

DEER PARK, Md., June 26.—Governor McKinney of Virginia, accompanied by State Treasurer A. W. Harman, K. C. Murray, editor of the Norfolk Landmark, and Mr. Lee Moore, came up from Harper's Ferry in General O'Dell's private car and spent Sunday here.

Overseer Shot by Negroes.

WEST POINT, Miss., June 26.—John Gay, overseer for a large plantation near this city, was assaulted by three negro hands whom he had ordered to work. Gay was shot in the face and lost an eye and was otherwise badly wounded.

DANVILLE, Ky., June 26.—C. E. Sayre of Atlanta and his two sons are riding from their home to the World's fair. Sayre's wife and little daughters accompany the men in a wagon, and the family is camping on route.
