K. Michael, in which the decision of the Hustings Court of this city rendering a verdict of \$10,000 and interest was sustained. There is no further appeal from this last decision.

Rev. Mr. Wilson Resigns.
Rev. Mr. A. Wilson, pastor of the East Roanoke Baptist Church, who received a second call on the first Sunday of the month, tendered his resignation last Sunday. Thursday night the church refused to accept his resignation. Mr. Wilson says his decision is irrevocable, consequently he will not serve the church any longer than the limit agreed upon in the first call, which was three months.

Social Smoke on St. Patrick's Day.

A CALL FOR A MASS MEETING.

Citizens to Consider the Matter of Holding an Exposition.

Linville Maders, the Horse Trainer, Who is in Favor of Combining the Race Meet With the Exposition, Will Bring a String of Horses Here in April—The Call for the Mass Meeting Outlines the Proposed Plans of the Southwest Virginia Industrial Exposition.

The proposition to hold an industrial exposition in Roanoke this fall is assuming tangible shape. The gentlemen who are at the head of the movement have issued a call for a meeting of citizens at the courthouse Monday night, which was numerously signed.

The statement published in yesterday's TIMES that a fall race meeting will be held here has added interest to the exposition and arrangements will probably be made by which the two events will be held together. Linville Maders, the horse trainer, left last night for his home in Lexington, Ky.

He will return to Roanoke about April 1, and will bring a carload of race horses with him. Mr. Maders was informed by a TIMES reporter yesterday of the proposed exposition, and said he saw no reason why it should not be held in conjunction with the race meet.

He has conversed with most of the gentlemen who own fast horses here, and they are all eager for the races. The exposition will embrace live stock, and he thought both would be benefited by combining.

The call for the meeting Monday night is as follows:

"THE SOUTHWEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL EXPOSITION."

"ROANOKE, Va., March 15, 1894.

"To the citizens of Roanoke and community: The above heading carries with it a meaning which cannot be expressed in a few words. To effect an organization at this time having for its object an annual exposition of the vast resources of Southwest Virginia is an undertaking of great proportions, and one which must necessarily be attended by many difficulties, but when the great benefits to be derived, not only by the city of Roanoke, but the entire community, from such an enterprise carried to a successful issue are considered, it presents itself in the light of the one moment by which the industrial development of the southwest can now be revived and maintained, and should bring to its support the united efforts of all persons whose interests, financial or otherwise, are associated with this section. That the resources of Southwest Virginia are known in a general way can not be denied, but even the best informed could not but be impressed by an accumulation of this scattered wealth in an attractive display.

"A more favorable time than the present will never present itself to our people. In the dawn of a new era of prosperity is seen the accumulated wealth of the North looking Southward for investment, while the vast resources of Southwest Virginia are just now in a state of development which enables them to be presented to the world in the light of their true value. The one thing standing in the way is the lack of co-operation on the part of our people, which it is the purpose of this move to overcome.

"To this end you are earnestly requested to attend a meeting to be held in the Hustings Courtroom on Monday evening next, March 19, at 8 o'clock for the purpose of effecting a preliminary organization to take the matter of permanent organization in hand.

"It is proposed to embrace all branches of industries including mining, manufacturing, lumber, agriculture, trades, household products, art, machinery, poultry, live stock, and to add as attractions racing, athletic sports, competitive military drills, etc., and all persons who feel an interest in any of these branches are cordially invited to attend."

Mr. Brodie was secured the latter part of last season from the St. Louis team by the Baltimore management, with whom he finished out the season.

His work was on the gilt edge order and was highly commended both by the public and the press. Mr. Brodie was reserved by the Baltimore's for this season and some time ago was sent a contract requiring him to play for the same salary he received last year, namely \$1,800.

This he refused to sign as he thought he was entitled to an increase in salary and asked for \$2,100. After some correspondence Hanlon acceded to Brodie's request and inserted that amount in the contract.
