"H. M. S. PINAFORE" TO-NIGHT.

The Old Yet Popular Comic Opera to be Produced for the Benefit of the Baseball Team.

Local amateur talent again holds down the boards at the Academy of Music to-night when the comic nautical opera, "H. M. S. Pinafore," will be produced for the benefit of the Roanoke baseball team. Last night a dress rehearsal was held at the Roanoke Light Infantry armory and it passed off so smoothly as to ensure a successful presentation to-night.

The opera, written by W. S. Gilbert and composed by Arthur Sullivan, was first produced at the Opera Comique, London, in 1878, but in spite of its age has lost little of its popularity among the music loving people.
