Death of Major Poe.

The Richmond correspondent of the Petersburg Index-Appal has the following: Major John Poe, Jr., chief of police of Richmond, died at 3:40 p. m. to-day from the effects of a stroke of paralysis he received some ten days ago. His life was given up last Friday, and he took an affectionate leave of his family that afternoon. Major Poe was 63 years old, a native of this city, and in his early life was a clerk in a store here. He was a soldier in the Mexican and civil wars. He became chief of police here in 1867, and has held the office ever since. No man in the city was better fitted for the duties of that responsible position. He had the confidence of the citizens and the love and esteem of those who served under him. He was a splendid detective, and made his force one of the best in the country. Some time ago he declared that if ever a big bank robbery should occur in Richmond from the outside of the building he would resign his office. Major Poe has worked up some of the biggest cases the country had in a quarter of a century. He had been twice married, but both wives are dead. About a dozen children survive him. It is expected that Senior Captain J. B. Angle will be made chief, though it is quite certain that he will have no position.


