County Court.

James City County Court was in session Monday and Tuesday. The time was consumed in trying Sarah Beech for the murder of her husband, Jim Beech. Sarah and Roland Holmes had been given 18 years in the penitentiary, but the woman was granted a new trial. The jury acquitted her Tuesday.

Mr. B. D. Peachy ably defended the woman and Mr. R. T. Armistead looked after the interests of the Commonwealth.

No other business of importance was transacted, except that the attorney for the Commonwealth brought up the question of the legality of the local option election. He contended that the election was illegal because not conducted under a secret ballot. The court rendered its decision, but two liquor men, for the sake of settling the matter attempted to apply for license, but the Commissioner of the Revenue, and the Treasurer refused to sign the applications. So the matter stands where it did the day after the election.

The expenses were as follows: To strings for musical instruments, 20c.; to play book, 55c.; 1 song, 35c.; bill for printing, \$3.82; 3 songs for Mr. Proctor, \$1.05; attendants fee \$1.00; 1 tie and errand, 23c.; 3 songs from Mr. Geo. Johnson, 75c.; 1 book, 25c. Making a total of \$8.20.

When the minstrels organized they voted to have a supper after the performance. The amount paid for the supper was \$6.80. The balance \$5.50 was turned over to the Athletic Association for which the donors received no thanks. The minstrel was gotten up and controlled by town people and the Dramatic Club had nothing to do with it whatever. I myself had no personal interest in the affair and am in no way responsible for anything connected with it, and I have ample proof to what I have said.
