18 SHOE FACTORIES CLOSED BY STRIKE

ST. LOUIS, MO.—Special.—The strike of shoe cutters has resulted in a general strike of shoe workers here. Eighteen factories, employing nearly 25,000 workmen, are idle. The general strike was called through sympathy with the shoe cutters.

The Big Fair at Lynchburg.
In another column will be found the advertisement of the Interstate Fair, to be held at Lynchburg, Va., October 22, 23, 24 and 25th, which gives every indication of being the greatest ever held in Lynchburg. The fair grounds will be brilliantly lighted three nights, and the midway and exhibition halls, while the infield in front of the grand stand will be used for superb displays of fireworks by the A. L. Dues Company of Cincinnati, which will be interspersed with vaudeville and music. In the afternoon, between the races, there will be performances by Howard Starrett's Society Circus, and a balloon ascension by Prof. Ed. Hutchinson, America's greatest aeronaut, who will be discharged from his balloon by explosion of a bomb in mid-air, and then descend to earth in a parachute. The races, for which more money is offered than at any fair in the State, except Richmond, will be fast and exciting. Arrangements are being made for over 150 of the best horses traveling the Southern circuit. All the live stock, poultry and farm product departments, promise to be unusually full, and the exhibit of improved machinery will in itself be a feature. In addition to the regular premiums, which are quite liberal, a number of silver cups and medals are offered as special premiums, which will cause the keenest competition. There is no other fair in the South of any size the first week in October, and as the Lynchburg Fair follows Roanoke and precedes Richmond, being conveniently located as to both these cities, it can be seen that the Hill City is specially favored this year. The midway will be lively and amusing, but will be free from disagreeable features. Among other fine shows the manager has secured the two great Illinois shows, "Creation" and "Pharos and Daughter," which have been the hits of the season at Coney Island. They come in their own special cars and bring their own bands. The show company's Dancers, which are thoroughly successful there must be something at a fair to please and interest everyone, but the same policy which has characterized the Interstate Fair from its start to the present will be strictly observed that there shall be no gambling and no shows bordering on the immoral, every thing to be clean enough for a "Sunday school picnic" or to be placed at Lynchburg fair, which caters specially to all those who believe in first class, high class amusement. The order maintained will be as it has been in the past, so perfect that ladies and children can spend the day at the fair without concern.

SEND EXPRESSMEN TO JAIL FOR A YEAR

Orebaugh and Gibson Plead Guilty of Stealing Chickens Shipped by Adams Express Co. and Given a Light Sentence.

RICHMOND, VA.—Special.—Three young white men—J. E. Orebaugh, G. C. Gibson and G. M. Shumake—were in the Police Court this morning, charged with robbing the Adams Express Company. All the young men were employed by the company as express messengers and each is in his early twenties. The first two were jointly charged with stealing twenty-six chickens and a quantity of clothing, the aggregate value being about \$250. The thefts, however, were committed at intervals, and it did not appear that any one theft had amounted to \$50, the amount necessary to make it a felony. Through an agreement between counsel, Harry Smith, representing the young men, and Wyndham H. Meredith, the company's lawyer, the young men entered a plea of guilty, with the understanding that the company would ask that each be given no more than a year.

Mr. Meredith explained that the company and himself had no wish to prosecute, and Orebaugh and Gibson were each given six months upon the charge of stealing the chickens and six months each for stealing the clothing.

The case was worked up by Detectives Luther Scherer and Tom Wren. That of G. M. Shumake was slightly different, and his case was continued until September 26th. In the meantime he will stay in jail.

Shumake is from Augusta county and was arrested yesterday. He was charged with stealing a trunk consigned to the express company and was arrested in Augusta county yesterday and reached Richmond last night, after engaging Attorney Curry, of Staunton, to defend him, in conjunction with Mr. Smith, of Richmond. Mr. Curry was unable to reach here today, and the case was therefore continued.

This arrest was also due to Luther Scherer, and Mr. Scherer explained that the company had agreed to be easy with Shumake upon the condition that Shumake would furnish it with certain information in his possession. This information probably relates to property that the young man has disposed of, or possibly property that has been disposed of by others, and the information is expected to lead to its recovery.

HAS SPENT MILLIONS IN TIDEWATER R. R.

Rumored That Building Virginia Road Has Embarrassed H. H. Rogers

SOLD STOCKS AT A LOSS

Friends of the Magnate, However, Insist That He Had Provided for Every Contingency and Will Not Be Crippled.

NEW YORK.—Special.—Reports have been current in Wall Street that H. H. Rogers, of the Standard Oil Company, had been a large investor in the Tidewater Railway project in Virginia, and that he had lost heavily by the investment. The Evening Post said yesterday that it can be stated positively that Mr. Rogers incurred a personal obligation in the Tidewater project much in excess of \$40,000,000. The Post also says that the situation has been entirely cleared up.

The Evening Post said: "Confirmation was obtained in Wall Street yesterday of reports to the effect that H. H. Rogers was heavily interested in the Tidewater Railway project.

"According to the stories previously circulated, upwards of 40 per cent. of Mr. Rogers' fortune had been involved in the Tidewater investment. It was reported yesterday that the personal obligation incurred amounted to \$40,000,000. It can be stated positively that the sum is much larger than the amount named; also that the situation has been entirely cleared up.

Had to Sell Stock Holdings.
"In order to meet the demands made upon him in connection with the construction of the railroad, Mr. Rogers was forced to dispose of a large amount of investment stock at a sacrifice. During the recent decline in prices the vice president of the Standard Oil Company sold six-eighths of his holdings of the Tidewater stock, such as Standard Oil, Consolidated Gas, Union Pacific and St. Paul, some five or six years ago, against the advice of his friends. Mr. Rogers started to build in West Virginia a low grade road, which would parallel the Norfolk and Western. His object was to carry coal and lumber to Tidewater. The line was to be 442 miles long. Only 125 miles have been completed.

Only a few months ago, in order to raise \$10,000,000 for the Tidewater Road, H. H. Rogers issued his personal notes secured by \$20,000,000 first mortgage bonds, \$10,000,000 stock and \$10,000,000 dividend or interest paying collateral. These six per cent. notes were endorsed by H. H. Rogers personally.

Buys Lumber and Coal Lands.
"It was rumored some months ago that the Standard Oil man and his associates had bought up all the available lumber and coal lands in West Virginia. These purchases amounted to thousands of acres, and will in some future time supply the Tidewater Road with traffic.
