A Chapter on Stains.

Acid stains, such as vinegar, sour wine, and fruit, can be removed from white cotton or linen cloth by pouring boiling water through it. This method is also efficacious in removing coffee stains.

For chocolate and cocoa stains use cold water first, then pour boiling water through the stained portion. To eradicate cream stains use household ammonia or aqua ammonia diluted with four parts of water. Dampen the spots with the ammonia, lay fresh blotting paper over them, and iron lightly. This also removes grease from white goods.

For linen badly stained with sweet cream try the following: Mix five parts of glycerine with five parts of water, and add one-fourth part ammonia. Apply to the stain with a soft brush, allow it to remain six or eight hours, then rub with a clean cloth. Remove the remaining dry substance with a knife. The stained places should then be brushed over with clean water, pressed between cloths, and dried. If the stain still remains, a rubbing with dry bread may take it off.

Grass stains on white dresses may be removed by washing the spots first in alcohol, then in clear water. To remove grease spots from carpets or cloth fabrics, place fresh blotting paper over the spots, and iron with a hot iron. If the spots are very large and obstinate, use a paste made of fuller's earth brushing it off when dry and renewing until the stain is removed. Use gall in the paste to preserve the colors of the fabric treated. —Farm and Fireside.

Rye Muffins.

One egg, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup milk, 1-2 teaspoon salt, butter size of walnut, melted and added just before the milk, 1 cup rye meal and 1-2 cup pastry flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder. Bake in muffin pans about 30 minutes.—Disappointed Evelyn.

SEEKS SURGEASE OF HER TROUBLES

Dependent on Account of Ill Health, Mrs. Naumann Drowns Herself.

SALUDA, VA.—Special.—Mrs. Cinda Naumann, wife of E. C. Naumann, committed suicide Wednesday night by drowning in the Piankatank river at her home at Turks Ferry, near here. Ill health was the cause. Nothing was known of the tragedy until her husband awoke, missing her from her bed. Her body was found about noon in the river not far from her home. Mrs. Naumann was thirty-five years old. She is survived by her husband and two children; also her father, Z. R. Coates, of this county; two sisters and two brothers—Mrs. H. L. Travis and Mrs. Alton, of Newport News; Rufus Coates, of North Carolina, and Frank Coates, of this place. The funeral will take place from the home Friday at 11 o'clock, and her body interred at Christ Church cemetery.

FREED OF POWHATAN MURDER.

POWHATAN COURTHOUSE, VA.—Special.—At the opening of court Thursday morning Commonwealth's Attorney Bonifant informed the judge that he was unable to secure sufficient evidence to convict Emanuel Brown, Charles Brown, Ollie Ross, Money Johnson and Annie Taylor, indicted for complicity in the Skipwith double murder. The cases were nolle prossed, and the accused were all released.

There remain still four prisoners to be tried in connection with the murder, which was committed in February. These are Nannie Taylor, who has already been indicted; Stephen and Fleming Johnson, and Robert Taylor. The last three named may be used as witnesses against Nannie Taylor, who is the wife of Isham Taylor, who was executed in connection with this crime.

Jam-Making Hints.

1—Use only good, dry, ripe (but not overripe) fruit.
2—Purchase only good sugar, either lump or preserving; inferior kinds spoil the flavor of the fruit.
3—A copper preserving pan is best, but a castiron enamelled steppan does excellently.
4—Do not have the pan more than three parts full, otherwise there will not be room for the jam to boil as it should do.
5—The jam must be allowed to boil quickly the whole time, otherwise it will be a bad color.
6—If the fire is very fierce or the pan thin, place it over the fire, not directly on it.
7—If you wish to keep the fruit whole, boil the sugar and water to a sirup first, then put in the fruit, otherwise put all in together, or if you prefer it, cook the fruit slightly first.
8—Skim the jam well and often.
9—If two kinds of fruit are to be used together, cook the harder variety a little first.
10—When the jam begins to get decidedly less, pour a little on to a plate, let it get cold; if it then forms a jelly it is done.
11—Pour the jam into clean, dry jars, and when they are cold, cover them with parchment paper, or with thin paper brushed over with white of egg.
12—Keep the jam in a cool, dry place.

FRENCH LINGERIE.

There is no better way to finish the little girl's underwear than the edge of dainty hand-embroidery after the French. It may be the narrowest possible scallop or the tiniest vine or forget-me-not dotted on at intervals. It may be done in eyelet or seed or solid stitch, but embroidery it should be for wear with the best little gowns. The drawers should be finished the same way, and the neck and armholes of the small undershirt. There is a certain other dainty finish for these little nainsook garments—narrow Valenciennes—that is irreplaceable, but the flannel petticoat should always be embroidered.

It is never an evidence of good taste to overdecorate the underwear of little children—or of big children, either.

When hand-embroidery is not possible, and when good laces are not available, there remains the alternative of the inch-and-a-half hem topped by a bunch of tiny tucks; and in this case great care should be exercised to secure the best of nainsook or batiste. The quality of the material will carry the garment when some cheaper substitute for trimming would not.

Laurel Wreath Hair Ornament.

Beauty as well as achievement is now crowned with laurel. The dark green, glossy leaves are used in artificial form to make coronets for evening wear. On reddish or golden hair the leaves are especially effective, though these green hair ornaments are becoming to dark women also. Often the leaves are touched with sparkling rhinestone dewdrops in very charming fashion.

DIFFERENT STORY IS TOLD BY WOMAN

Her First Evidence Served to Acquit Slayer of Husband.

RALEIGH, N. C.—Special.—A murder with sensational facts surrounding it occurred near Bellamy's Mill, in Halifax county, on the farm of C. R. Adcock, on Sunday. The alleged facts in the case as learned in this city are as follows:

Sunday morning W. H. Clark and Charlie Flannigan, two residents of the neighborhood of Whitaker's in Nash county, went to the home of Levy Marriott, and after spending part of the morning there drinking and carousing, Flannigan drove off to ride with Mrs. Marriott. Upon his return to the home Marriott became enraged and began cursing Flannigan. According to the facts learned, Flannigan bore the cursing for several minutes, but when Marriott addressed a remark to him, telling him that he must leave the house, Flannigan turned and fired a pistol ball into his body, the ball striking over his heart and killing him instantly.

A hearing of the case was held at Glenview on Monday afternoon, at which time Flannigan was dismissed upon the grounds that the shooting was justifiable.

The man got off by the fact that his friend Daniels and the woman were the only witnesses to the affair, and it is thought that they "framed up" testimony that would clear the man of the crime. However, it now develops, according to the woman's statement, that she was bought off, and that she did not tell the facts as they really are, and that Flannigan shot her husband because of a remonstrance on account of their intimacy.

Flannigan has been rearrested, and another hearing is being held. The woman's statement is to the effect that Daniels and Flannigan promised to

support her the rest of her life, as well as pay the funeral expenses of the dead man, if she would testify right in the first hearing. However, they did not keep their promise in this matter, she declares, so she told all, causing Flannigan's second arrest.

PHILADELPHIA IN THROES OF STRIKE

Street Car System Tied Up—Major Threatens to Seize Cars and Run Them for Public Convenience. Sympathizers Make Demonstration.

PHILADELPHIA, PA.—Special.—Strike-breakers and motormen from other cities were put to work Monday in an effort to break the strike of the motormen and conductors of this city. Notwithstanding these importations, not a car left any of the barns after 8 o'clock Monday night, and at 10 o'clock the last car had been taken off for the night.

Sympathizers of the strikers made demonstrations at the barns, and many arrests were made by the police. Most of the prisoners were charged with nothing more serious than calling the working motormen and conductors names.

Mayor is Emphatic. One of the chief demonstrations was at one of the West Philadelphia barns, when the strike-breakers under heavy police guard began taking out cars.

A squad of mounted police had to charge the crowd repeatedly before it dispersed. Finally the cars were started, but most of them ran almost empty the entire length of the route, while the spectators along the sidewalks made scoffing remarks.

Mayor Reburn stated that he would swear in 10,000 extra policemen if necessary and keep the cars running for the convenience of the public. The public will be accommodated, the Mayor said, if the city has to take over the transit company's lines and run them itself with the firemen, the police and the extra police.

BOMB FOUND ON VESSEL. BUFFALO, N. Y.—Special.—Two pounds of dynamite, capped and fused was found in a discharge pipe of the ballast pump of the big steel lake freighter, Frank T. Haffelinger, at her dock here.

Nine men of the crew were asleep within a few feet of the explosive, and had it been discharged they would all have been killed and the big freighter would have been seriously wrecked.

The Haffelinger is a lake carrier boat and is manned by a full non-union crew.
