**NORFOLK PRESBYTERY.**

Yesterday there were twenty-two ministers and seven elders present upon the session of the Norfolk Presbytery. The morning sermon was delivered by the Rev. W. H. T. Squires, of Knox Church, Norfolk, and it was pronounced one of the ablest heard during the meeting. Miss Charlotte Price, of Norfolk, addressed the Missionary Society on home missions. Last night the Rev. Joseph E. Rennie, of First Church, Norfolk, delivered the sermon.

The members of the Presbytery were given a reception at the Williamsburg Female Institute Wednesday afternoon. The guests were entertained with music by the students, and delightful refreshments were served. Short addresses were made by Rev. W. H. Groves and Rev. R. A. Robertson. Others expressed themselves as to full for utterance.

Wednesday morning Dr. J. E. Booker made a splendid and encouraging address on Synodical Home Missions, and Rev. W. H. T. Squires read an interesting paper on Foreign Missions.

The following were elected commissioners to the General Assembly: Ministerial Delegates—Rev. Chas. Fred. of Onancock, Rev. P. B. Henderlite, Newport News. Alternates—Rev. C. S. Lingamfelter, Berkeley, Rev. J. A. Lacy, Cape Charles. Elders—Dr. J. W. Ayler, of Newport News, F. S. Royster, of Norfolk. Alternates—Dr. Seymour Ward, Belle Haven, and T. B. Robertson, of Eastville.

The place for the next meeting was fixed at Holmes church, Eastern Shore, and time Tuesday, September, 13th, 7:30 p. m.

The Presbytery will close its labors here tomorrow morning, and after adjourning the members will visit places of historical interest about town. This is as fine a looking body of men we have seen in Williamsburg on any occasion, and among them were some of the leading ministers of this section of the state.

The final sermon will be preached tonight. Rev. Mr. Lingamfelter will preach in York river church, Magruder, tomorrow night. Rev. Frank L. Delaney, of Suffolk, preached a very fine sermon in the Methodist church last night.
