**Important Hearing in Baltimore.**

By authority of the Secretary of War a Board of Officers of the Corps of Engineers, consisting of Colonel Thos. Casey, Major Mason H. Patrick and Captain Warren T. Hannum, will assemble at the U. S. Engineer Office, 309 Custom House, Baltimore, Md., at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday June 7th, 1910, for the purpose of holding a hearing upon the subject of establishment of regulations to govern the placing and operating of nets, pounds, traps, and other fishing appliances in Chesapeake Bay and its tributary waters, with a view to reaching an adjustment which will be just and equitable to all interests. At this hearing representatives of navigation interests and the fishing industry will be heard; but it is desired that so far as possible, their views be submitted in writing.
