

SAYS THAT LOVE IS MUCH BETTER THAN FLAKY PIES

Feminine Educator Declares That Mothers Should Spend Less Time Over the Hot Cookstove and More Time Getting Acquainted with Their Families.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—If you crave the study of sociology you will find better opportunities at home than in the slums.

If less time were devoted to cooking, sewing and housecleaning and more to sympathizing with husbands and children, more homes would be abodes of rest and peace.

Miss Edna Day, of the domestic science department, of the University of Chicago, waxed epigrammatic yesterday as she pointed out weaknesses of her own sex in an address before the Douglas Park Womens Club.

"It more meals were brought at the delicatessen on the corner and more time spent in getting acquainted with husband and children there would be less acrimony at the fireside," was the keynote of the address.

"The time spent in servile work had better be devoted to the cultivation of sympathy and tenderness," she added. "Though the children may never be able to tell other women of the flaky pumpkin pies, the crisp doughnuts, palatable cookies, and gingerbread, and other dainties that mother used to make, their appetites will be just as good.

"The devotion of the children to the home will be lasting than if their mother was known only as a good cook."

Miss Day said the home is a more proper place for sociological research than the tenement district.

HOCH WOULD LET DOCTORS CARVE HIM.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—"Shall condemned murderers be vivisected?" This question raised by Chancellor E. Benjamin Andrews of the University of Nebraska in an address, was put to Johann Hoch here yesterday. Chancellor Andrews said that murderers owed it to society to offer their bodies in the interests of medical science and there is hope that they might survive the intricate operations and live good lives afterward.

Johann Hoch, the bluebeard with thirty two wives, who is believed to have slain eleven of them, said: "I would be willing for the sake of humanity to let doctors chloroform me and go to work, but would stipulate that they dose me so strong that I would never awaken. What's the use of living if, after you get out, everybody points the finger of scorn at you? Yes, I'd rather have the doctors than the rope."

Hoch is sentenced to be hanged December 15th.

TOWN ALMOST DESTROYED BY GAS

PARKSBURG W. Va. Nov. 1.—Fire started this morning in Pingsgrove hotel at Pingsgrove from natural gas. An explosion destroyed practically the entire town.

A bank, a Methodist church a office building, seven stories high and ten dwellings were destroyed.

Dynamite was used to stop the progress of the flames. It is reported that several lives were lost. The loss is \$200,000.

TWENTY-SIX LIVES LOST

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The Swedish steamer, Johann, of 1724 tons and the Russian bark, Antares, of 310 tons, both founded recently in the North sea after a collision. Twenty six men of the two crews were drowned.

NUMBER OF DEAD NOW REACHES SEVEN

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 1.—The number of killed in the Rock Island wreck at Casey, Iowa, last night has now reached seven. The bodies of two other emigrants, names unknown, were drowned in the wreckage.


