## JEW'S BUTCHERED BY THOUSANDS IN ODESSA

Women and Children and Even Women with Infants in Arms are Ruthlessly Slaughtered.

### HUNDREDS ARE STARVING

Two Doctors Attended 300 Children Horribly Gashed About Head and Shoulders.

ODESSA, Nov. 6.—The latest estimates of the casualties in Odessa proper, which are founded on statements made by police authorities, are that 3500 persons were killed and 12000 were wounded.

In the suburbs of Moldovanka 1000 dead lay in the streets from midnight until noon Sunday, when the authorities dug large pits in the grave yards and buried them without coffins or regard to age or sex, simply throwing them into a hole and shoveling dirt over them in order to conceal the number of dead. In Brokhorva a neighborhood, in the Jewish quarters, men, women and children, an even women with infants in their arms, were butchered ruthlessly by marauders.

Hundreds are suffering for want of bread, and the authorities are making apparently no effort to relieve the famine.

Damage to private property is estimated at \$5,000,000.

A section of the university has been heavily fortified by the students, who declare that they will bring all the Jewish women and children in the city and protect them until the government realizes its responsibility.

Two private doctors attended more than 300 children of both sexes who had been horribly gashed about the head and shoulders with sabres.

"Heaping insult upon injury, the civil governor today, when the butchery had ended, asked the householders to subscribe \$100,000 to pay the police increased wages."

It is alleged that the police and soldiers everywhere marched at the head of the mobs, inciting them to destroy the Jews by crying: "The Jews have killed our emperor," and similar expressions.


While the mobs were engaged in the slaughter the soldiers busied themselves pillaging the cash and jewels, leaving the household goods to the mobs. The owners of many houses got rid of the bandits by the payment of a ransom to the police.

### REPRIMAND FOR YOUNG.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The Record in the court martial case of Commander Lucien Young, who commanded the Bennington at the time of the explosion on that vessel in San Diego harbor, was received at the navy department today and is now under review. It is understood that the sentence of the court is a severe reprimand.

## ELEVEN DIE IN OKLAHOMA WIND STORM

Terrible Cyclone Visits Town of Mountain View Leaving Death and Destruction in its Wake—More Than a Score of Wounded Reported.

MOUNTAIN VIEW, O. T., Nov. 5.—A terrible cyclone visited this city on the southwest at 5:40 yesterday afternoon and plowed its way through the northwest practically destroying everything in its path. Eleven dead have been found so far, while more than a score of wounded have been reported so far. The Manhattan hotel has been converted into a morgue. A special train was run from Anadarko, bringing 50 nurses and every physician in town to this city. Between this city and Anadarko more nurses and physicians were secured.

This catastrophe is second only to the Snyder disaster last spring.

A terrible rain proceeded the storm and the streets are flooded with water and mud and as the town is nearly a mile from the depot, where messages have to be filed, it is hard to make much progress.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 6.—The body of Winona Charlotte Newton, 15 years old, was found today beside a bridge over a small stream on the outskirts of the city. The girl had evidently been murdered as her face was disfigured and there were many cuts and finger marks on her throat. A 150 pound stone weighted her body. The theory is that the girl was murdered by a lover after a quarrel.

### HAND SMASHED BY STEEL RAIL.

Louis Henry, one of the steel gang of the Great Northern, had his hand smashed this morning by one of the heavy steel rails falling on it. Dr. Culp was called and found that several bones were badly smashed.

## ENORMOUS APPLE CROP AT MONITOR

Mr. G. T. Richardson will this Year Net Over Eleven Hundred Dollars Per Acre on His Apple Orchard. 40 Boxes From One Tree.

"I've seen a number of big red apple stories in the Wenatchee papers during the past few weeks, and I can tell one has good as any of them," said G. T. Richardson, of Monitor, who was in the city Saturday marketing a small portion of his phenomenal crop. This is the substance of his story.

This season two acres of trees, numbering 155 produced 2400 boxes, of which 2000 boxes are of the best grade.

The trees are 11 years old and were not irrigated until two years ago. Mr. Richardson is holding these apples, which are of winter varieties, for better prices. He has been offered \$1.50 a box, which makes the crop worth \$1500 an acre. As the most of the picking was done by members of his own large family, the net profit is about \$1150 an acre. One tree of Virginia Greenings produced 40 boxes and a Baldwin produced 28 boxes.

Mr. Richardson has 10 acres in young orchard from which this season he sold peaches, pears and berries to the amount of \$1000.

"Chicago buyers paid a number of my neighbors as high as \$1.75 per box on the tree for Spitzenbergs and other early varieties before they were ripe," continued Mr. Richardson. "We consider Monitor the garden spot of the Wenatchee valley. Watch her grow."

### MYSTERY SHROUDS

#### SHOOTING OF FIVE.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—Three children of James, Brennan, Alice, aged 10 Lizzie, 15 years old and Arthur, 5 years of age, are dead. Thomas, 11 years old, was badly hurt, and his stepmother, 27 years old, was fatally shot in a mysterious manner at two o'clock this morning.

The woman says a stranger shot through the window hitting the children first, then herself. The woman has previously tried to commit suicide twice.
