### SUBMITS TO KNIFE FOUR TIMES A WEEK

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—A dispatch  
to the Tribune from St. Cloud, Minn.,  
says: "John Janski, of this city,  
aged 22, is a human stone quarry.  
Fourteen months ago he was the victim  
of an explosion in a quarry, and ever  
since then the doctors have been pros-  
pecting, every time with good results.  
Four thousand pieces of stone have  
been removed from various parts of  
Janski's anatomy. A piece of granite  
weighing an ounce came out of his  
arm in an operation yesterday and  
another of half an ounce weight was  
removed from the socket of his eye,  
which was lost in the explosion.  
Four times a week Janski, without  
taking anaesthetics, submits to the  
knife."

### TOM JOHNSON WILL TRY TO STOP SUICIDE

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—A dispatch  
to the Tribune from Cleveland, Ohio,  
says:  
"Mayor Tom Johnson, alarmed at  
the official report that there have been  
sixty eight suicides in Cleveland in the  
last nine months, has taken steps to

check the carnival of self destruction.  
He has appointed a commission whose  
duty it will be to attempt to dissuade  
would be suicides from taking their  
own lives

The commission is made up of Director  
of Charities Cooley, W. A. Green-  
lund, a member of the charity bar-  
eau, and State Senator elect F. C.  
Howe.

Every man or woman in Cleveland  
who is contemplating suicide is invited  
to write a letter to the anti-suicide  
commission and tell their troubles.  
The members of the commission will  
then make an effort to remove the  
trouble.

For those despondent from non-emp-  
loyment the commission will endeavor  
to obtain employment, while the  
needs and wants of others seeking aid  
are to be looked after. All three men  
are experienced in such work.

BOSTON, Nov. 10.—Charity work-  
ers in conference at Tremont Temple  
yesterday listened to a discussion of  
"Unpaid Boards and Visitors in Public  
Charity," by Miss Julia C. Lathrop,  
of Hull House, Chicago.

In a discussion of "Tuberculosis as  
a Social Disease", Dr. S. A. Knapp  
expressed himself as most emphatically  
opposed to the custom of persons hav-  
ing tuberculosis being allowed to

New York, Nov. 10.—Coincident

wife, formerly Frieda Marsh, who  
obtained a decree of divorce on sta-  
tutory grounds today. Judge Gilder-

the papers.

### NO DAMAGES FOR HIS WOODEN LEG

SEATTLE, Nov. 11.—Carl D. Spaul-  
ding cannot collect damages against  
the Seattle Electric Co. because a  
Madison street car ran over his arti-  
ficial leg and injured it, although pain-  
lessly. Judge Albertson this morning  
handed down a decision to this effect.  
In the suit Mr. Spaulding brought  
against the company he alleged that  
while trying to board a car at Thirty-  
sixth avenue and Madison street he  
slipped on the long grass and fell under  
the car. His artificial leg was badly  
damaged, and he sued for injuries.

### PLAN ROOSEVELT TEMPLE OF PEACE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The  
tribute paid to President Roosevelt in  
London yesterday in connection with  
the lord mayor's parade, as directed  
attention here to a suggestion emanat-  
ing from J. Selwyn Tait, local repre-  
sentative of the International Banking  
Corporation, that the triumph of the  
president as a peacemaker be perpetuated  
by the erection in the capitol city,  
of a magnificent "Roosevelt Temple  
of Peace."

The author of this project feels that  
there will be no difficulty in raising  
by public subscription a fund sufficient  
to erect a structure in every re-  
spect worthy the triumph at Ports-  
mouth.

The suggestion is that there be  
erected a building of heroic proportions  
to be used for conventions and meetings  
of national character, to be of rich  
design with ornamentation emblematic  
of peace and perhaps symbolic of  
the success of President Roosevelt in  
tightening the bonds of brotherhood  
between the north and the south."

### WOMAN LEAPS TO HER DEATH

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—In view of  
hundreds of shoppers on State street,  
Miss Fannie Baines, of Detroit, Mich.  
jumped from the fifth story window of  
one of the principal department stores

today. She was instantly killed  
Several persons barely escaped be-  
ing struck by Miss Baines' body.  
Arising from a settee close to the  
window, Miss Baines suddenly climbed  
to the ledge, opened the window  
and with a loud scream, threw herself  
toward the pavement

### FATAL REVOLT IN KISHINEFF

ODESSA, Nov. 13.—The prisoners  
in the jail at Kishineff, Bessarabia,  
revolted in a body, and demanded  
their freedom.

On the request being refused the  
prisoners set fire to the jail.

Troops were hurried to the scene and  
fired a volley into the matineers, of  
which 22 were killed and many  
wounded.

### WEALTHY GIRL IS KIDNAPPED

PRAIRIE DU CHEIN, WIS., Nov.  
13.—Agnes Pfeifer, aged 16 years, an  
orphan and heiress to a large amount  
of property, has been kidnapped from  
a school here

During recess a closed carriage  
drove up to the play grounds, two  
persons leaped from it, seized Miss  
Pfeifer, hurried her to the carriage  
and drove away before anyone could  
come to her assistance

The police have been unable to  
find any clew to the kidnapers or their  
motive.

### FINDS \$1500 IN A STUMP

CAMBRIDGE CITY, IND., Nov.  
13.—Wrapped up in a bundle of news-  
papers, \$1,500 in bank notes was found  
by Clarence Mason, a farmer living  
five miles southwest of this city this  
afternoon. The money was concealed  
in a hollow stump. Mason also found  
a dark lantern and a large brass ring,  
supposed to be a piece of safe. The  
papers wrapped about the money were  
identified as belonging to the First  
National Bank at Hagerstown.

surance Co. if, at the expiration of  
thirty days, it did not secure the re-  
turn of contributions to the Repub-

and secure the resignation of certain  
of its officials, Willard D. Vandiver,  
superintendent of insurance of the  
state of Missouri, today issued the  
formal order cancelling the certificate  
of authority to do business in the state.
