GRAND STAND FALLS WITH 2000 PEOPLE

ANN ARBOR, MICH., Nov. 20.—At the football game here this afternoon the grand stand, with fully 2,000 people, fell a distance of fifteen feet. Cries of agony arose from the injured.

Both the members of the Michigan and Wisconsin teams immediately tore the fence down and a crowd of people rushed in to help the injured.

The stand went down so gradually that hundreds on the lower tiers of seats had time to reach the ground. No one was seriously injured.

Scores of people, however, were badly bruised and scratched in the tumbling. These were hurried to the dressing rooms and their injuries were attended to by doctors on the ground, aided by the players, trainers and rubbers.

After a lapse of ten minutes, due to the accident, the teams lined up and play was resumed.

Only a half dozen of the 60 people who went down in the collapse of the west bleacher were injured beyond very slight bruises.
