FAITH THAT REMOVES MOUNTAINS.

From Sioux City, Iowa, comes the tale of a man named Barnard who started a restaurant three years ago with a capital of \$40 and has just retired with \$12,000 cash accumulated in his business.

That it is possible in Sioux City, or anywhere, by any sort of management, and more especially by Mr. Barnard's kind of management, to make a restaurant earn so much from so little in so short a time seems incredible. For Barnard absolutely reversed the usual business rule. As the tale is told:

He trusted everybody. Any hungry person could eat at Barnard's. He carried unemployed persons for a year at a time. He never dunned a delinquent. He clung to the theory that the world is honest.

According to the business experience of countless generations Mr. Barnard ought to have failed in a week or less, having only forty dollars to start with. But, according to the story, he did not fail. He went on and on for three years, until he had turned his original forty dollars into \$12,000. The story seems well authenticated and may be true.

If it is true, then plainly Mr. Barnard is a very unusual man, and his success is one which could not be duplicated by any save a man of like character. For the reason of his success is evident. It was due to a faith in the essential honesty of mankind so absolute that it made honest and, or nearly all, those with whom he did business. His faith in them must have literally compelled his debtors to pay, because they could not do otherwise.

It is to be hoped that the tale is true. Even if it is only partly true it proves that average mankind are a great deal better than we are prone to think, and that St. Paul, when he spoke of "faith that removes mountains," was using no mere figure of speech, but was indicating a mental and spiritual condition that might and could exist and be potent in shaping the conduct and destiny of man.—Chicago Inter Ocean.
