CONSUL SEES EXECUTION OF SLAYERS OF MISSIONARIES

HONGKONG., Dec. 8.—The American commissioners, who have been inquiring into the murder of the missionaries at Lienchow, concluded the taking of evidence last week, but their departure has been delayed. Consul Lay insisted on witnessing the execution of the culprits before leaving. Washington and Peking were in communication on the subject, at the consul's request, and today he obtained his desire, as three of the murderers were condemned to die today. It is probable that the commission will remain in Lienchow until after the execution.

SHAROFF TREATED PEASANTS IN A HORRIBLE MANNER

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 8.—The news of the assassination of Lieutenant General Sakharoff, former minister of war, who was shot in the governor's palace at Saratoff December 5, had been preceded by the most horrible stories of the manner in which Sakharoff had been repressing the agrarian disorders. He corralled peasants with Cossacks and then had them beaten with the soldier's whips. In so doing Sakharoff pursued the system adopted by Prince John Obolenski, former governor general of Finland in suppressing the agrarian in the vicinity of Kharoff, several years ago, when the prince caused the peasants to be whipped by relays of Cossacks and compelled them in turn to beat their comrades.

The following is a description of Sakharoff' arrival at Hovanchina, one of the village of the province of Saratoff:

"He came with Cossacks and artillery. The peasants were surrounded by Cossacks and Sakharoff addressed them, demanding that they surrender their leaders. The village elder replied, but gave the general no information. The elder was immediately beaten until he lost consciousness. Sakharoff then retired to the court house, leaving the peasants at the mercy of the Cossacks, most of whom were drunk pulling out their hair and beards, and even tearing pieces of flesh from their faces. Thirty three peasants were thus maltreated."

Robbed Bellingham Bank

BELLINGHAM, Dec. 8.—With nearly \$1,000 on his person obtained from the Citizens bank of Blaine in return for a fraudulent draft on a San Francisco bank, C. F. Kelly, alias C. J. Coil, was arrested in the Bank of Bellingham today. Kelly secured a draft on a Seattle bank for \$600 and a \$400 certificate of deposit on the Blaine bank in return for the bogus San Francisco draft and at once came to Bellingham. Here he made a heavy purchase of jewelry, cashing both papers at a local jewelry store. The draft and certificate were deposited in the local bank and shortly after a message from Blaine explained that they were fraudulently obtained. Kelly was caught just as he was boarding the train for Seattle.

The Small Mouthed Bass.

The small mouthed bass fully deserves his reputation for being vigorous and gamy from infancy. He is extremely pugnacious by nature and has fighting tactics peculiarly his own which for strength, activity and craft are unequalled. I once took a bass four inches long on a spoon hook, the bowl of which was more than two inches long. This bass does not hesitate to tackle that terror of all other fish—the fierce and voracious pickerel. With his first dorsal fin rigidly set up, he lays off some ten or twenty feet and then makes a rapid dash right into and under the "long face," forcing him to clear out at once or ripping him so badly that he is hors de combat. The fact has been established that bass introduced into a pond containing pickerel will ultimately destroy the latter. The same fate awaits other fish, including trout.—Outing.
