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## CONTROL FLAMES WEST OF VAN NESS AVENUE

Late Dispatches From General Funston State That Fire in San Francisco is Under Control in Parts of Residence District

San Francisco, April 21.—At ten o'clock last night the entire city was plunged into absolute darkness, all the lighting plants having been consumed. Immediately a gale sprang up fanning the flames on Nob Hill which swept the North Beach section, completely destroying it. The flames then veered south to the immense sea wall sheds and warehouses. It licked these up and then headed for the magnificent ferry building and Southern Pacific terminals.

The authorities have sworn in a thousand special police armed with government rifles. In addition to these three more national guard companies have arrived. The flames in the westerly section of the city, among the only residences standing, have broken out afresh. Where buildings were far apart and where all fire fighting forces were concentrated, there have been only about a hundred burned, and at midnight the fire is said to be under control there.

At seven o'clock this morning everything between Bay street and Meiggs wharf on the waterfront was a raging furnace. The wharves for quarter of a mile east are still safe, but in the opposite direction they are all consumed. All fruit canneries have been destroyed. The gas company's tanks are burning the gas having been released.

Several vessels off shore, hid in the smoke, are throwing streams into the blaze. Communication with Oakland is threatened.

The water front emergency hospital is on fire and the patients have been removed across the bay. A strong wind is blowing down walls on Market street and the thoroughfare has been closed by the authorities, this shutting off the only means of reaching the ferry.

Three men were shot while trying to loot wrecked treasury at midnight. Sixteen more were killed by soldiers Thursday night while trying to enter United States mint. Two Chinese were shot by soldiers for refusing to obey orders.

Six hundred laborers have arrived and an attempt is being made to open the sewers as pestilence is feared. Six babes have been born in the camp of the homeless in Golden Gate park.

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## MAKES IMPORTANT CHANGE IN BYLAWS

Fruit Growers' Association Agrees to Allow no one Stockholder Over Five Votes no Matter How Many Shares he Owns

The trustees of the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers association met last Saturday afternoon in the office of the association in the Ellis-Forde building and completed the details of the organization. Everything is now ready for business which promises to be good for the new association.

There had been some difference of opinion concerning the matter of voting the stock, and at this meeting an amicable and it is believed, fair adjustment of the matter was made by agreeing that each stockholder should have one vote for each share of stock, providing however that no stockholder, no matter how many shares he shall hold, shall have over five votes.

It was feared, and not without grounds that should stockholders be allowed one vote for each share of stock, irrespective of the number of shares he held, that some one person would buy up enough shares to get a controlling interest in the association and conduct it in a way detrimental to the interests of the fruit growers of the valley for whom the association was primarily organized to protect.

After discussing the matter thoroughly the following resolution was carried:

Resolved: That it is the unanimous opinion of the board of trustees of the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers association that article 9 of the bylaws of this corporation be amended at the first regular meeting of stockholders so as to read, "That each person, either in person or by proxy, shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock he owns provided, however, that no stockholder shall have more than five votes regardless of the number of acres he may own." And it is further the sense of the board that each member of the board shall use his best endeavors to secure the amendment of said article 9 as above set forth.
