## ATTEMPTED ASSAULT PRECIPITATES RIOT

rant was being attacked, he sat in the rear smoking a cigar and holding a rifle. In the melee, James Haynes, who had arrived from Decatur on the 2:30 special was shot by Charles Hunter, a negro porter. Hunter was seized by the mob, dragged from the building and, amid yells, a rope was fastened about his neck and he was dragged to a tree and hanged. His suspended body was riddled with bullets.

The city is now apparently quiet. The soldiers are patrolling the streets and the saloons are closed. To guard against any further disorder, Governor Deneen ordered several regiments from various parts of the state to report at Springfield, including the entire First Regiment of Chicago. It is expected that three full regiments will be on the scene tonight.

A later wire brings the news that W. H. Bows, a clerk in the county treasurer's office, was attacked early this morning by a gang of negroes, and fatally injured. He was taken to a hospital where he died. The attack was made while he was on his way home this morning, the negroes firing on him until he fell. His pockets were searched and all his money taken. A diamond ring was also taken from his finger and a diamond shirt stud was missing.
