CONCERNING WOMEN.

Branch No. 28 of the National Association of Letter Carriers (St. Paul, Minn.) has endorsed woman suffrage. Letter carriers, officially and unofficially, almost always favor woman suffrage, probably because they come into close contact with their homes and realize the industry and devotion of the home-makers.

The women of France, who are the cutters of precious stones, get about \$1.80 a day. This is the highest wage paid women of that country, while the lowest, 60c, is paid to dressmakers. There are 14,000,000 adult women in France, and they are just beginning to realize their need of political enfranchisement from an industrial standpoint.

Rev. Anna Howard Shaw is spending her summer in Geneva, Switzerland. She will return in time to preside at the National Convention of Woman Suffragists at Buffalo, October 15. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the International Woman Suffrage Alliance, will spend September and October speaking in Holland and Denmark.

The mine is burning, and it is feared that all will burn to death before help can reach them. The rescuers are working desperately, but the burning coal produces suffocating gas which, together with the flames, makes the attempt at rescue almost impossible. The scenes enacted about the mine by the families of the entombed miners are pathetic in the extreme.

Following is the notice sent out by the postmaster:

Notice to Patrons of City Delivery.
The Wenatchee postoffice is under instructions from the department to withdraw one delivery service each day during vacation period of city carriers. Each carrier is entitled to fifteen days leave of absence, to be taken at such time as the postmaster may designate. Carrier No. One, who serves that portion of the delivery district south of Palouse street is now absent on leave. This route will be served in the afternoon. Route No. 2, or all of the district north of Palouse street, will be served in the morning. Special delivery of business men's letters will continue as usual.
