RECEPTION TO THE VISITING METHODISTS

DELEGATES TO COLUMBIA RIVER ANNUAL CONFERENCE RECEIVE WARM WELCOME AT METHODIST CHURCH.

At the Methodist church last night a reception was tendered to the visiting delegates to the Columbia River Conference which is to be held in this city during the next six days.

The meeting was opened with Rev. O. W. Mintzer, presiding elder of this district in the chair. He introduced Mayor Gellatly. He referred to Mr. Gellatly as the "Moral Regenerator of the City."

Mr. Gellatly said: "Wenatchee has entertained many secular and commercial organizations and received much profit therefrom in a material way. But this meeting is the first opportunity Wenatchee has enjoyed of welcoming an organization, which has for its purpose the moral up-building of a community."

Wenatchee is a diamond in the rough, but fast improving. I hope that next time you come to Wenatchee there will be here, in place of the ten saloons, new additions to all of the churches. I will take this opportunity of stating that, according to the brewers' own prediction, Wenatchee will be on the "dry" list inside of two years. Perhaps I have no right to give this out, but I will do so nevertheless.

"As a school director, as a parent, as a city official I welcome you,

and hope you will come to this city again next year."

Following this, Rev. A. J. Adams, on behalf of the churches of the city, extended a welcome to the visitors. He deprecated the tendency on the part of many leaders in all denominations to upbuild their churches rather than the cause of righteousness in general.

F. W. Cooper, on behalf of the Methodist church of this city, was introduced by Dr. Mintzer and welcomed the visiting Methodists in a hearty manner.

In response to the addresses of welcome, Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, whose episcopal residence is at San Francisco, made an address, which is pronounced by those who attended as one of the best of its kind ever heard in Wenatchee.

The Bishop said: "Mayor Gellatly suggests the different type of man who is now becoming prominent in the public life of our country. The day of straddling moral issues by our politicians is past. The American people will rally to the support of the man in whom they believe. Mayor Gellatly represents this new type of man, and more power to his right arm. Saloon patronage will decrease this week by reason of the conference held in this city. The silent influence of good men always has such an effect upon a city."

"In fact, I promise that because of the Methodist conference in the city this week THE SALOONS WILL NOT BE ENRICHED BY ONE DOLLAR. (Great laughter and applause.)"

In response to the welcome by the churches in Wenatchee, the Bishop said, "God is not pleased with 182 branches of the church. Catholicism can rightly censure Protestantism for the introduction of its many schisms. We welcome the day when the barriers between denominations will be burned down."

Speaking of Wenatchee, he said: "I wrote to my ten-year-old boy today. I told him that this was 'surely the Garden of Eden, for a man is sorely tempted to take an apple. Your daddy is away out here in a valley of the northwest, where PLUMS GROW AS BIG AS PEACHES, AND PEACHES GROW AS BIG AS APPLES, AND APPLES AS BIG AS CANTELOUPES, CANTELOUPES AS BIG AS WATERMELONS, WATERMELONS AS BIG AS PUMPKINS, AND PUMPKINS AS BIG A ALL OUT OF DOORS." He closed his remarks with a plea for a great conference; one in which a right spirit should dominate. At the session this forenoon the following organization was effected:

GRIMSHAW ELECTED BY A BIG MAJORITY

VOTE ON THE COUNTY TICKET

COUNTING OF BALLOTS PROCEEDS ALL NIGHT, MORNING AND AFTERNOON.—RETURNS OF SMALLER PRECINCTS IN EARLY THIS MORNING.

Interest in the county ticket has been intense from the beginning. Crowds in every balloting place in the county watched each of the first few ballots as they were slowly counted. The first few ballots in Wenatchee precinct required sixteen minutes for counting.

By ten o'clock only a dozen tickets had been counted in both Columbia and Wenatchee precincts.

The first inkling of how the judgeship vote would stand was a phone from Leavenworth. By watching the tickets as they were spread out for counting they had been checked off, and Cashmere phoned in 60 to 80 majority for Grimshaw.

By the time 25 ballots had been counted in both Columbia and Wenatchee precincts it was highly evident that Grimshaw had been elected.

Then the interest began to center on the sheriff's office. For a while it looked most favorable the county over for Ferguson. Insko, however, continued to pile up a good vote in Wenatchee.

Several surprises were sprung; among them was the vote received by J. W. Hutchinson. Mr. Hutchinson has been in the valley but a short time, but is polling a strong vote.

Martin Spencer leads Bousquet for county treasurer by an easy majority in most of the precincts.

LEADS OUT AHEAD OF REEVES

BY HEAVY VOTE.

William A. Grimshaw is elected superior judge by a heavy majority. In Wenatchee, Columbia and West Wenatchee precincts Grimshaw leads by a vote of nearly two to one.

In Lakeside, Grimshaw polled 61 votes to Reeves 28. At Chelan, Reeves forged ahead of his competitor at the rate of 91 to 56. At Monitor Reeves again lead by 30 to 21. At ten o'clock this morning at Cashmere, Grimshaw received 91 votes to Reeves 44.
