# MILLIONS FOR VANCOUVER, B. C.

PRESIDENT ELLIOTT MADE STATEMENT AS TO CONTEMPLATED IMPROVEMENTS FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA TOWN.

(By Associated Press.) VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 4.—Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific railway, was here today and promises several important improvements for Vancouver, including terminals to cost several millions of dollars, a joint passenger depot for the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern and several extensions of the road. He also said Vancouver would be linked with Galveston, Texas, by means of lines owned jointly by the Northern Pacific and Great Northern and would be made the Pacific coast terminal port for cotton goods and other shipments destined for the Orient.

# OREGON-WASHINGTON BRIDGE

COMMITTEES OF TWO STATES TO DISCUSS BUILDING OF INTERSTATE BRIDGE AT VANCOUVER.

A resolution was adopted in the Oregon legislature this week providing for a committee of two senators and three representatives to meet a like committee from the Washington legislature to formulate plans for an interstate bridge to be built at Vancouver. The plan is for the cost of the bridge to be defrayed jointly by Washington and Oregon.

The people of this city do not object to another city on the Columbia river having a wagon bridge across it, but it is hoped here that no action on this matter will be taken until the state purchases the bridge already built on the Columbia river.
