# RED APPLES SURVIVE COLD

THE MOST OF THE YELLOW APPLES ARE AMONG THOSE TAKEN BY THE FROST IN THE YAKIMA COUNTRY.

Jack Frost is partial to rosy cheeks, not only in enhancing their charms on skating parties, but in sparing them on the red apples in the Yakima valley, says the Yakima Republic. Practically all of the apples that are at all abundant this year are the red varieties. The yellow apples are most of them among the 40 or 50 per cent that have perished.

### Reports Coming In.

From the reports gathered by the Horticultural union, it appears that there will be a fair crop of the Kings, Winesaps, Black Twigs, Robe Beauties and Red Cheeked Pippins, all of which are red or red cheeked apples. Of the Ben Davis apples there will be practically none; the Arkansas Blacks, Newtown Pippins and Spitz-enbergs will be few.

There will be good crops of prunes and plums and a good crop of grapes and the Winter Nellis, Anjou and Bartlett pears will ripen in fair abundance.

## ALL OVER THE GREAT STATE

The Hastings mill of the Larson Lumber company, located at Silver beach on Lake Whatcom, was totally destroyed by fire Monday afternoon. The mill was valued at approximately \$10,000 and was insured for \$7,500. It was a shingle plant, with a daily capacity of 100,000.

### Fatally Injured in Shafting.

A man named Caspar, an employe of the Yeoman's mill at Pe Ell, was taken to the hospital in South Bend Saturday night, suffering from injuries received when he was caught in the shafting of the mill, died Sunday morning.

### Four Year Old Girl Drowns.

While wading in Lake Union off the foot of Blaine street in Seattle Saturday afternoon, Margaret Eleanor Drake, the 4 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Drake, got beyond her depth and was drowned. The body was recovered.

### Index Mine Suffers Loss.

The blacksmith shop and powder house at the Nonpareil mine at Index were destroyed by fire a few days ago. Several boxes of caps exploded, but the dynamite near by burned quietly until consumed.

### Palouse Bank to Open July 15.

The new National Bank of Palouse will be capitalized for \$50,000 and will open its doors by July 10. Geo. C. Jewett will be cashier and manager. The new bank officers have purchased the defunct Palouse State bank building for \$16,000.

### Attorney Quits State Service.

Frem M. Llewellyn, formerly of Spokane, Bellingham and Aberdeen, who has been briefer in the office of the attorney general, has resigned to become state attorney for a Tacoma insurance company.

### Caught in Butte.

Tom Sullivan, who escaped from the Olympia jail six weeks ago, the day after he was sentenced, has been arrested at Butte, Mont. He will be brought back. Sullivan was sentenced to a term in the "pen" for robbery at Tenino. After the trial he declared he would murder the presiding judge when he was released from prison.

### Is Chief Clerk.

Herbert Q. Hale, former deputy state immigration commissioner, was elected chief clerk of the land board at Boise, Idaho, Wednesday. He is an elder of the Mormon church.

### Crackers Exploded in Pocket.

Roy Beck was badly burned about the hips Wednesday at Krupp as the result of the explosion of a bunch of firecrackers which he was carrying in his pockets.

# TO RECLAIM MOSES LAKE LAND

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS NOW AT WORK IN QUINCY DISTRICT—TRY EVAPORATION PLANT AT MOSES LAKE.

Following the plan adopted by the reclamation service and the United States geological department, an investigation of the conditions which will have to be met in the Quincy district, in central Washington, J. C. Stevens, district engineer in charge of the geological work, and Howard Kimball of the reclamation service are now in the field.

Under the direction of Mr. Kimball an evaporation plant is being established near Moses Lake postoffice. This plant will determine the amount of annual evaporation of the waters of the lake, and gaging stations also will be established on Crab creek inlet and outlet of the lake, to determine the annual flow of water in and out.

### Tests for Water.

These tests will show what amount of water is available for irrigation over and above the maintenance of the usual stage of water, since Moses lake is a navigable body.

These investigations are especially important in view of numerous propositions for irrigation in that district. Pumping plants have been seriously considered, but have been found impracticable, since water in sufficient quantities for a large commercial proposition can not be used without depleting the water supply and endangering the interests of navigation.

### Storage Reservoir.

The evaporation plant and gaging tests will determine whether the situation would permit a vast storage reservoir to be created and the water used on the surrounding lowlands.

Engineer Stevens will shortly add another quadrangle of the United States geographical survey, and this will extend the mapping east from the Columbia river below Wenatchee and will include the formerly neglected district of Moses lake and one water shed of the Big Bend country. One and possibly two squares will be mapped the present season.

### Investigate 3000 Square Miles.

It is Engineer Stevens' intention to investigate the entire water shed the waters of which pass into and through the Moses lake basin by way of the Crab creek valley, the drainage area of which is some 3000 square miles and extending from near Spokane to Ephrata, east and west, and from near the Columbia on the north, or a large part of the Big Bend country.
