Philippine Tariff Nonsense.

San Francisco, July 2.—Gen. Jas. Francis Smith, governor general of the Philippines, thinks that the opposition in this country to removing the Philippine tariff is all nonsense.

"The one important question from the Philippine standpoint is the tariff," said the general. "The Payne bill provides for free trade between the Philippines and the United States and that would be the greatest benefit the islands could receive."

"I cannot understand this opposition to removing the tariff. It seems to me it results from fear based on lack of knowledge rather than on sound reason. The sentiment that the Philippine production of sugar and tobacco is so great that local American interests would be hurt is all nonsense."

Despite Smith's previous prohibition of military and naval questions, I ventured to ask him if he thought the Japanese are casting longing eyes on the Philippines.

"No, I do not," he replied promptly. "All that kind of talk originates, I think, on this side, and has little, if any, real basis of fact to sustain it. Japan, in my opinion, is animated by the most friendly of feeling toward the United States."

"The Filipinos, in my opinion, are not ready yet for independence. They are naturally gifted, but unfortunately the great body of the people have not been educated, nor can they be for more than a generation to come. The people are eager for instruction, and when the great majority of them have been educated and have acquired democratic methods of thinking, I see no reason why they should not be trusted to establish and maintain a democratic form of government."
