world the Chinese commission preferred the bids and the equipment of the American company which manufactures the Bell telephone equipment to those of English, French, German and other foreign manufacturers, who were not contestants for the big contract.

In all China, with its 400,000,000 population, there is virtually no telephone service now, for the 2,000 instruments in the whole empire are in private use by foreigners resident in that country. These are the old, hand-ringing, obsolete kind, and they are practically individual connections between the homes of the foreign residents. There is no use of the telephone there for the trade and other business. The American installation, however, is to be complete in Peking, beginning with two switchboards one at each end of the city, costing \$150,000.

Afterwards plants will be installed in Tien Tsin, Canton, Hankau, and other big cities of China. With Chinese hello girls answering the general call for "Central" the ancient empire of the Orient at last will be modern.—New York Press.
