## AMERICAN SCHOOL BEST FOR JAP

PRESIDENT OF IMPERIAL UNIVERSITY OF KYOTO SAYS YOUNG MEN OF HIS COUNTRY NEED TRAINING IN U. S.

Berkeley, Cal., Jan. 17.—The declaration of Baron Kikuchi Dairoku, president of the Imperial Japanese university at Kyoto, that Japan depends largely for her future upon the education her young men will receive and that the United States is regarded by many leading Japanese as the very best training school for their youth, is causing considerable comment on the University of California campus today. Baron Dairoku delivered an address before an audience of University of California students Friday evening. After explaining that his visit to the United States is for the express purpose of studying American educational methods, he said:

"Until the recent Chinese and Japanese wars my country held the record for continuous peace. Those wars were a struggle for existence on our part. Now that we have emerged from them we must look to national development and we turn our eyes to the west. Education must pave the way for our success.

"So far as the United States is concerned, our feeling is one of friendliness. There should be no militant

talk among the people of either nation where the people of the other are concerned."

**After Good Roads.**  
A fine highway stretching from Puget Sound to the ocean beach, suitable for automobile and carriage travel, will be one of the objects the state good roads association will work for when it meets in its annual session in Aberdeen. Pierce, Thurston, Mason and Chehalis counties, through which the road will pass, are expected to combine in building it.

Although the beach has been one of the favorite resorts in the summer time for years, the journey by road has always been more or less hazardous. The different counties have improved stretches of the highway, but have never got together with the intention of making it a continuous good road. At the coming meeting of the state association all the counties will be represented by delegates, and then some concerted action looking to the "Sound to the Sea" highway is expected to be taken.—Mason County Journal.

## THE SPORTING WORLD

Wootton, Great English Jockey. It is said that Jockey F. Wootton, who rode out Danny Maher as leading English horse pilot of 1909 will ride the horses of W. K. Vanderbilt on the English tracks next season. The

report states that Vanderbilt is to give the youngster the snug sum of \$25,000 for his services.

Wootton is fifteen years old and made an astounding record by riding more than 100 winners. His younger brother, Stanley, has beaten him in many hard races. W. Higgs, an Irishman, finished third, with over 100 wins.

**International Polo.**  
An international polo contest will be seen at Saratoga, N. Y., during the racing season next summer. Harry Payne Whitney has invited the famous Hurlingham polo team of England, from whom Whitney's team wrested the challenge cup last summer, to come over and try to win the cup back again. The British team has accepted, and some stirring matches at this aristocratic game are assured. It is generally understood that the same Meadowbrook aggregation that Whitney headed in England will defend the cup.

Saratoga has one of the best equipped polo fields in the country. The field is lightning fast, and this insures a classy polo series. The matches will be played while racing is in progress.

**Trap Shooting Team to Athens.**  
America will have a representative team of amateur trap shooters at the Olympic games in Athens next year, according to a resolution adopted by the Interstate Association for the Encouragement of Trap Shooting in New York recently.

Tom Marshall, mayor of Keithsburg, Ill., was authorized to pick the team. The Grand American handicap for 1910 will be held in Chicago next June. The Eastern handicap at Philadelphia in July, the Southern handicap at Columbus, Ga., in May; the western handicap in Des Moines, Ia., in August and the Pacific Coast handicap at Seattle early in September.

**Gould to Race in France.**  
Frank Gould is establishing a racing stable in France, where he will compete with other American millionaires who have been so successful on the French turf. Recently he concluded the purchase of the horse Gaverro from the French banker Lazams, and later six more horses were placed in the Maison Lafite as the nucleus of his stable, with which he hopes to win some big French prizes. Since he visited Paris Mr. Gould has been much interested in racing, and he has never missed a meeting.

**Western Intercollegiate Alliance.**  
The Western Intercollegiate Conference Athletic association ("big eight") made a one year alliance with the Missouri valley conference at the annual meeting of the former body recently. This is an athletic movement under which the two organizations will be able to schedule games. The Missouri valley conference is composed of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Ames, Drake and Washington (St. Louis) universities.

**Michigan Out Again in 1910.**  
Coach A. A. Stagg's prediction that the proposed meeting of the "big eight" coaches would fall through came true when it was announced at the University of Chicago that the session had been called off. The indications are that the western schools will drop the Michigan question and allow the present intercollegiate organization to continue for another year.

**One Thing Americans Can't Get.**  
Lord Londale's championship belts that are being offered in England as emblematic of the different pugilistic titles can be competed for only by British boxers. A stranger can box for the title, but he does not get the belt if he wins.

**Had Much Military Experience.**  
J. F. Fort, of the Breese-Webber Hardware company and one of those instrumental in organizing the company of national guards here, has seen much army service, having spent three years in the Philippines, served some time in China during the Boxer movement and was in charge of 1,500 men during the disaster of San Francisco.
