

### Expert May View Okanogan Project

RIVERSIDE, OMAK AND OKANOGAN CLUBS WANT PROPOSED EXTENSION OF IRRIGATION SYSTEM INVESTIGATED.

Riverside, Feb. 3.—A meeting of representatives of the Riverside, Omak and Okanogan Commercial Clubs was held this week to discuss the matter of the extension of the Okanogan irrigation project across the river to take in several thousand acres on the Colville Indian reservation. The three towns named are all under the government project. The reservation lands affected are at present occupied by Indians and to a great extent are under cultivation. Each Indian holds an allotment of eighty acres for each member of his family. A proposition has been tentatively made to the Indians that they surrender seventy acres of each allotment and receive free irrigation water from the government for the remaining ten acres. In exchange for the seventy acres of river lands they are to take an equal acreage back in the hills.

The Indians affected do not take kindly to the proposition and have sent a protest to the commissioner of Indian affairs at the national capital. They say that a number of them have lived on the lands in question from ten to twenty years, and that they do not feel inclined to give up their homes, on many of which quite extensive improvements have been made. The lands in question lie along the east bank of the Okanogan river, that stream being the western boundary of the reservation. The north line of the reservation is about a mile and a quarter south of Riverside.

The Okanogan project is 97 per cent completed, and the people of the south part of the project are in favor of the plan to extend it into the reservation. No opposition has been expressed in the north portion, or in any part of the project, but as the present plans of water distribution do not give any water to the north part, the Riverside delegation to the meeting mentioned insisted that the government be urged to send here an expert to investigate the feasibility of watering the north portion from Duck and Goose lakes, located on what is known as Pogue prairie. A bill is to come before the present session of congress in regard to the matter of extension of the project into the reservation, and the local delegation urged that the sending of an expert here be made part of the bill. Further meetings of the commercial clubs of the project towns will be held in regard to the matter.

### PLANKED CHICKEN.

This Recipe Will Serve Two or Four Persons Liberally.

Select a chicken of about two pounds in weight and cut off the neck on a line with the top of the collar bone. Cut the chicken down the entire length of the backbone, clean and wash inside and out. Flatten the breast bone with a cleaver or wooden mallet, and unjoint the wings and second joints. Let it broil, skin side down, over a bed of coals or under the gas flame about six minutes, then turn and cook about three minutes on the skin side.

Baste liberally with butter and let it cook in the oven (or farther from the gas flame) about an hour. Baste occasionally with melted butter.

Have a plank made hot in the oven. Set the chicken on the plank, skin side down. Fill the space between the chicken and the edge of the plank with hot, boiled rice. About the chicken dispose four flowerets of hot cooked cauliflower, four corn fritters, four hot stuffed tomatoes and four slices of bacon, rolled, pinned with a wooden toothpick and fried in deep fat. Serve cream or Hollandaise sauce in a bowl.

Points of Cats Worth Knowing. The day is past when everything that purrs or mews is considered a cat worth having.

With the ever increasing cult of the cat owners are becoming more particular about good points, and considerable study is expended by fanciers on the necessary qualifications.

Such qualifications, of course, vary with the breed. In long haired cats the ruff is the first thing to be considered. The tufts of hair between the toes, the ear tufts and the flexibility of the tail come next, says Home Chat.

With the short haired cats the color is of great importance, and so are the eyes, ears and the shape of the head. White cats should have blue eyes, black cats yellow eyes and those of other colors green eyes.

Here are some of the good points to be taken into consideration when buying a cat:

- Head.—Great breadth between the eyes.
- Eyes.—Round and wide open.
- Nose.—Short and tapered.
- Frame.—Light, deep chested.
- Legs.—Straight.
- Ears.—Small and rounded.
- Neck.—Thin and graceful.
- Tail.—Bent at the end in long haired cats.



The erection can be easily carried out in white art muslin thrown loosely over the pile of favors to be distributed, affording the unevenness necessary to suggest the various blocks of ice. The "pole" itself is made of flowers, and heads of white daisies or chrysanthemums are scattered over the muslin. This novel method of concealing the gifts before they are distributed is much appreciated by the small guests. In among the foliage edging the base of the design may be placed fairy lights or small variegated electric lamps, which brighten up the general effect.
