MAY HAVE WOMAN FOR MAYOR

REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC PARTIES WILL EACH NAME NOMINEE—SEVERAL WOMEN CONSIDERED.

Denver, Colo., March 2.—A woman mayor for Denver. This is the gossip following a banquet of prominent Denver women to which no men were invited. The election is two years off, but it is whispered that the advisability of having a woman candidate in the field—perhaps two of them—was not only discussed, but was advocated with enthusiasm. It is asserted that more women than men voted in the last municipal election in Denver, also that women officials who have held office in Colorado have proved efficient. One of these, Miss Katherine L. Craig, former state superintendent of public instruction, is mentioned as a most probable nominee by the republicans. The gossips already have settled it that Mrs. Sarah Platt Decker will be the democratic nominee for mayor.

Mrs. Dewey C. Bailey is recognized as one of the most influential republican women of Colorado. But an obstacle appeared in the way of her possibility as a candidate for mayor, as it is said the republicans are likely to name Mr. Bailey, her husband, for mayor.

Texas Independence Day.

Austin, Texas, March 2.—Texas today entered upon the seventy-fifth year of her independence. It was on March 2, 1836, that the convention of patriots, in session at Washington, on the Brazos, declared the independence of Texas and began the drafting of her constitutions. In accordance with a custom established many years ago the anniversary was observed today as a legal holiday throughout the state. The state and city offices, the banks and courts were closed in honor of the day, and in all the public schools the story of the fight for independence was related to the pupils.

The battle of the Texas patriots against Mexican tyranny forms one of the most thrilling chapters of American history. In 1824 Mexico achieved her independence from Spain and established a republican

government. Bustamante, the usurping governor of Texas, prohibited, in 1830, further immigration from the United States, fearing that the white settlers would not be dominated as were the Mexicans. Santa Anna, with whom the colonists sided, overturned the Constitution of 1824 and declared himself dictator. The Texans continued their efforts for the observance of the Mexican Constitution, but, goaded by tyrannical oppression, declared their independence.

Interest in Langford-Ross Fight.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 2.—Fight fans of Pittsburg and vicinity are displaying considerable interest in the bout between Sam Langford and Tony Ross, which is to be pulled off tomorrow night by the National Sporting club. The agreement calls for a contest of six rounds. In the judgment of the critics the go should prove one of the liveliest seen hereabouts in a long time.

Good Thing for Stockholders.

New York, March 2.—Stockholders of the American Radiator company, in session at Orange, N. J., today approved the financial plan recently proposed by the directors. The plan provides for the withdrawal of \$2,000,000 of the company's authorized but unissued preferred stock, which is to be replaced with \$2,000,000 of common stock. This keeps the total authorized capital at \$10,000,000 as heretofore. The new common stock issue to the amount of \$800,000 is to be allotted to the present stockholders at \$150 a share in the ratio of one new share for each ten shares of the old. The common stock of the corporation was recently placed on a ten per cent yearly dividend basis.

KEEPS A TERRIBLE 'BOOK OF FATE'

London, March 2.—The "Book of Ironies," by G. Bernard Shaw, promises to be a social terror. It was started years ago by the distinguished dramatist who decided to probe romance to the core.

The volume is a double column scrap book. On one side are the pasted announcements of betrothals, marriages and anecdotes of celebrities. The opposite column is left blank until some years have passed. The other clippings, either from divorce trials, newspaper statements or written comments supply the ironical epilogue.

For instance an 1894 cutting alludes to the marriage of J. M. Barrie and Mary Ansell. "They are extremely happy. The novelist-dramatist enjoys nothing better than to lie on the Thames bank using his wife's hairpins as pipe cleaners. May their happiness increase through the flight of years." Opposite this is pasted the notice of the recent divorce decree.

Other cuttings refer to the Marlboroughs. The grim volume describes the death of many authors and artists through drink and excess.

Tibetan Railroad.

Shanghai, March 2.—A Chinese railroad, built by Chinese engineers and Chinese workmen, with Chinese capital, into the sacred empire of Tibet, is one of the rather startling features that is on the boards, the preliminary steps of the move having already taken place.

An army of 25,000 Chinese troops last week routed the army of the Dalai Lama, the Buddhist monk at Lhasa, the sacred city, and the lama has fled to India. There he appealed to Lord Minto, viceroy of India, but as the territory is part of the Chinese empire, Lord Minto refused to interfere.

GRANT COUNTY TAX RATE Separation from Old Douglas County Falls to Cause Predicted Increase.

Trinidad, Wash., March 2.—Two years ago, when county division was being proposed people were warned about high taxes, but the tax rolls for Grant county show the rate is less than one-half what it is in the old county of Douglas.

Frank Rothrock has bought the alfalfa hay on the West Bar ranch and has moved 2,000 sheep there from the Kittitas valley.

Politics and Politicians.

Senator Piles of Washington will probably retire from office at the end of his present term to become the legal representative of the Guggenheim interests.

Two hundred and sixty-three of the 390 members of the national house of representatives, or nearly 70 per cent, were born in the states they represent.

Michigan's dry territory may be increased next month when a number of counties are to exercise their privilege of voting on the question of abolishing the saloons.

The free-for-all race for the republican gubernatorial nomination in North Dakota is likely to receive impetus soon by announcement of Judge Nehemiah Davis, of Minot, of his candidacy for the nomination.

Eau Claire has voted in favor of the commission plan of government, being the first Wisconsin city to adopt the plan as provided by the new state law.
